



Lewis and Court Streets were reconstructed. Despite some challenges which delayed the project, curb & gutter, sidewalks and paving were completed in late fall. Crews will come back in Spring 2020 to grass seed and mulch.



2019 saw a great deal of planning for the Legion Park Event Center. This collaboration added to the Platteville experience of public-private partnerships benefitting the community.





The Community Development Department completed a GIS layer with interactive maps for both Greenwood and Hillside cemeteries that can be resourced by staff and citizens.

The Friends of the Mining & Rollo Jamison Museums continued its philanthropic work, with the goal of raising \$73,000 in 2019 for the Museums – including \$47,000 to support museum operations in response to the reduction in funding from tax levy dollars.

As of December 4, the Friends are at 61% of their annual goal, and 81% of their Museum Operations Support goal!











The revised and redesigned Employee Handbook was finalized and adopted in February.




Reconstruction of the Legion Field Parking Lot was started in fall 2018, but work was delayed due to extremely wet weather.

The project was completed in spring 2019.

In May and June, City staff relocated to temporary offices in preparation for Phase 1 construction of the City Hall remodel.









Bonson Street between Furnace and Market Street was converted to a one-way street to reduce crashes at the intersection of Bonson and Furnace.

The conversion included a handicapped parking stall with curbing to direct Bonson Street traffic onto Market Street. Landscaping was completed by the Parks Division.

Approximately 80 community members attended Loud @ the Library, and the Foundation raised over \$1,600 at the event.










Community Development staff completed the grant administration for the former Pioneer Ford property redevelopment which assisted with the construction of the Ruxton Apartments.





Community input resulted in an increase in project scope for the Business 151 Highway Safety Improvement Program. The scope was increased to include pedestrian crossings at Water Street and bike accommodations from Staley Avenue to Water Street.


Animal Rescues!

In July, Sgt. Grabandt rescued nine ducklings after the mother of the ducklings had been struck by a car.












PEAK Program Volunteer of the Year Eileen McCartney's yoga and strength class has become a favorite senior activity.




Hillside Cemetery paving was completed in July with extensive support to prepare the road base by the Street Division and J&N Stone.

A thin overlay was completed on Camp Street from Lancaster Street to Western Avenue.










In lieu of the citizen's academy, the Platteville Police Department chose to have an Open House.

New park signs were created and installed over the summer. The new signs are a continuation of a city-wide branding effort.








Senior Center participants were treated to a free breakfast and tour of the Holiday Inn Express and Platteville Public Library.

Community Development staff assisted in the completion of the housing study and needs analysis.











Alden Avenue sewer and water replacements were completed in May and August respectively.









The Library endured a major upgrade to the integrated library system (library catalog), Verso. Staff navigated this challenge with a smile and continue to adapt as the technology improves.












Construction began on the Legion Park Event Center.



The Community Development Department completed a comprehensive electronic and paper update to the official zoning map.





A project to restore fifty-two upper level windows of the Hanmer Robbins building, where the majority of the museum collections are kept, was completed. Clear window film and solar shades were installed to protect collections from UV radiation damage.

New pickleball court lines were added to the courts at Memorial Park.

The project was completed in partnership with UW-Platteville.







Construction in the former City Manager/City Clerk office was completed in December. This space is the new home of the combined Finance department including Water & Sewer billing. Staff moved on Friday, December 6 and an Open House was held on Friday, December 13.



The Police Department held the 9th Annual Community Picnic in September. This year's event was held at Harrison Park.



Community Development staff completed the review and inspections for the Aldi building addition and remodeling project.

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The Community Safe Routes Committee installed flags on portions of downtown Main Street to help with pedestrian visibility.

Construction on Well 6 began in fall of 2018. This project improves water clarity and lifespan.

Start up procedures took place in late June and Well 6 was completed and online July 15.

Well 4 closed when Well 6 became functional.





The City received a new bus on September 29 and a new taxi on June 26.















The Platteville Public Library offered a variety of amazing programs in 2019.

The Platteville Airport received funding through the state Bureau of Aeronautics to replace the 30-year old underground fuel tanks.

Despite some delays in the manufacture and installation of the new tanks, they were up and running by the September 30 ribbon cutting ceremony.
