Project Update 08/07/2018

Lead Service Lines (LSL): There are 571 known lead water service lines identified within the City of Platteville. The City has a total of \$500,000, plus another \$10,000 toward day care facilities. There have been 421 properties that have reserved funds for this program totaling \$468,264. There is \$31,736 available to reserve, or enough for about 27 homes. There have been 307 lines that have been completed with a total of \$340,336.30 distributed. Staff received the reimbursement for the 2017 LSL installations. DNR received the paperwork for the second-year grant.

Wastewater Treatment Plant Studies: There are continuing studies for Phosphorus. MSA is looking at recent DNR changes that may allow exemptions to the new rules for a period. In accordance with the DNR guidelines, we have submitted the Preliminary Plan that reviews all alternatives and determines which are feasible and economical for further study. For Platteville, this includes either upgrades to the plant at a capital cost of millions of dollars, or a possible waiver where the City pays a "penalty" of thousands of dollars per year for the amount of phosphorous we discharge over the limit. At the end of the waiver period, we are likely going to be required to do capital upgrades. We have discussed this on July 20 and will be presenting to the Water & Sewer Commission in September.

2017 Projects

Well 4: This well has an aesthetic issue. Due to grout failure after approximately 50 years of service and increased drawdown levels, air is being entrained in the water. Air in water is not a health issue. It makes water appear cloudy until the air escapes. It can also cause water hammer in pipes. For this reason, we have limited the use of Well 4. We have received permission from the DNR and are awaiting permission from the PSC. Bids have been received and will be approved at the August 8 Water & Sewer Commission meeting - subject to PSC approval.

2018 Projects

Virgin Ave & Pine St: This project will reconstruct Virgin Ave from Main St to Business 151 including water, sewer, storm sewer utilities. It will do the same for Pine Street from Water to Virgin. Staff and Delta 3 held our first Public Information meeting on January 16. Bids were opened and the bid was awarded by the Council on March 27. The Water & Sewer Commission awarded their portion at the April 11 meeting. Underground work is complete, except for clean up of sanitary sewer at the intersection of Bus 151 and Ellen St. Curb & gutter has been installed on the entire project. Most of the sidewalk is installed. Paving is complete on Virgin Ave from Bus 151 to Laura St. One layer of asphalt has been placed on the block of Pine St from Water to Ellen. Landscaping has been installed from Bus 151 to Laura and is being completed on the rest of the project.

Lutheran St: This project is complete except for punchlist items and to ensure the grass grows.

Mineral St Parking Lot: This project is complete except for punchlist items. Parks crews installed decorative stone and landscaping.

Legion Field Parking Lot: This project will reconstruct the main parking lot off of Pitt Street west of the ball fields. It will have a wider driveway entrance onto Pitt Street with marked parking stalls. Bid opening was on March 2. The item was approved at the March 27 meeting. This work will be done between Dairy Days and winter.

Hillside Cemetery Paving: This project will have the Street Division do rough preparation of the gravel base for the access roads in Hillside Cemetery, then Iverson will pave these access roads.

Basketball Courts: This project will evaluate the existing courts and as budget allows, either resurface or fully reconstruct the courts. This was added as alternate bids for the Legion Field project. Of the three courts, the reconstruction of the Smith Park basketball court nearest Ridge Avenue was approved at the March 27 meeting. It will be done in conjunction with the Legion Field parking lot.

Rountree Branch Streambank Restoration: Staff worked with Delta 3 Engineering and Angie Wright to submit a grant request for 50% grants from the DNR to fund work in 3 locations. One location is at the Chamber of Commerce/Katie's Garden. The other two locations are on UW-P property. There is an intergovernmental agreement between the City and UW-P where UW-P pays the local share of the projects on their land. We expect grants to be awarded in fall for 2019 construction. Delta 3 provided additional information as requested by the DNR.

Business Highway 151 Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP): This is a safety project on Business Highway 151 to reduce traffic crashes. The proposal will be to do design in 2019 and construction in 2020. It will convert 2 lanes to 3 lanes from Staley to Eastside Road and convert 4 lanes to 3 lanes from Eastside Road to the divided 4 lane road by A&W. There will be pedestrian accommodations at the Water St and Eastside Road intersections. There will be a pedestrian path from NOVUS to Eastside Road. The cost share is 90/10.

Description:

City staff has been meeting with a local club of ATV/UTV enthusiasts who are interested in establishing designated ATV/UTV routes in the City. Recently Grant County has opened all the County Highways to ATV/UTV traffic and the townships around Platteville have previously opened their township roads to ATV/UTV traffic. The ATV/UTV representative would like to have connectivity with the township roads and the County Highways surrounding Platteville and the ability to travel through Platteville on routes designated by the City. The ATV/UTV Club feels that businesses in Platteville will see an increase in revenue due to the access granted by the establishment of ATV/UTV routes.

Staff have had discussions with nearby communities who have adopted city routes, including Lancaster and Monroe. Generally, the communities have reported few issues with the routes and have noted a positive economic impact on local businesses. Fifteen communities of comparable size to Platteville were selected and surveyed for the purpose of determining if they had ATV/UTV routes and what their experiences were with the routes. Communities with college campuses were included in this survey. The communities surveyed included the following:

1. Ashland	2. Beaver Dam	3. La Crosse	4. Menomonie
5. Merrill	6. Portage	7. Reedsburg	8. Rhinelander
9. Richland Center	10. River Falls	11. Sparta	12. Stevens Point

Six of the surveyed communities have ordinances addressing ATV/UTV use. These communities were:

- 1. Ashland
- 2. Menomonie
- 3. Merrill
- 4. Reedsburg
- 5. Richland Center
- 6. Tomah

The ordinances for these communities and the results of the research are included as an attachment to this staff report. Generally, the communities reported few issues with ATV/UTV operation and indicated the routes have been favorably received.

The draft ordinance would identify routes, specific safety requirements and hour/season restrictions for the City of Platteville. In addition, the ordinance would specifically prohibit drinking and open alcohol containers for both drivers and passengers.

An open house on the potential ATV/UTV routes in Platteville was held at the High School on June 11th. Approximately 70 people attended this open house.

A survey soliciting information and opinions on the proposed ATV/UTV routes has been developed. It has been made available on the City website and copies were available at the open house. The results of the survey have been compiled. The survey was available through June 22nd.

Informational letters were sent to City residents who live along the proposed ATV/UTV routes. Residents were made aware of the survey and their responses were requested.

The Community Safe Routes Committee met on June 18th and a Motion was approved by the Committee to "recommend to the Common Council that more time be allowed for community input and research prior to a decision on ATV/UTV routes in Platteville".

The Parks, Forestry, and Recreation Committee approved a motion stating the following: "To suggest that the Platteville Council allow for more time for public input / education on the proposed ATV/UTV ordinance by delaying the vote this upcoming Council meeting to allow careful analysis of community input. Further, the Committee recommends the Council consider a sunset clause or limited routes for a trial basis."

The School Board determined it would not make a formal recommendation on the ATV/UTV issue. The School Board is interested in being part of the on-going discussion in terms of evaluating how things are going and the School Board felt this might be a good topic at the annual joint City/School District meeting.

The Fire Department Chief and the EMS Director have indicated they have no concerns about the ATV/UTV routes or their operation in the City.

Members of the ATV/UTV group will be present to answer questions about the proposal.

Budget/Fiscal Impact:

Signage for any routes designated by the City will supplied by the ATV/UTV Clubs as directed by the City. The Street Division would be responsible for installing the signs.

Recommendation:

If the Council desires city ATV/UTV routes, Staff recommends the attached ordinance be adopted.

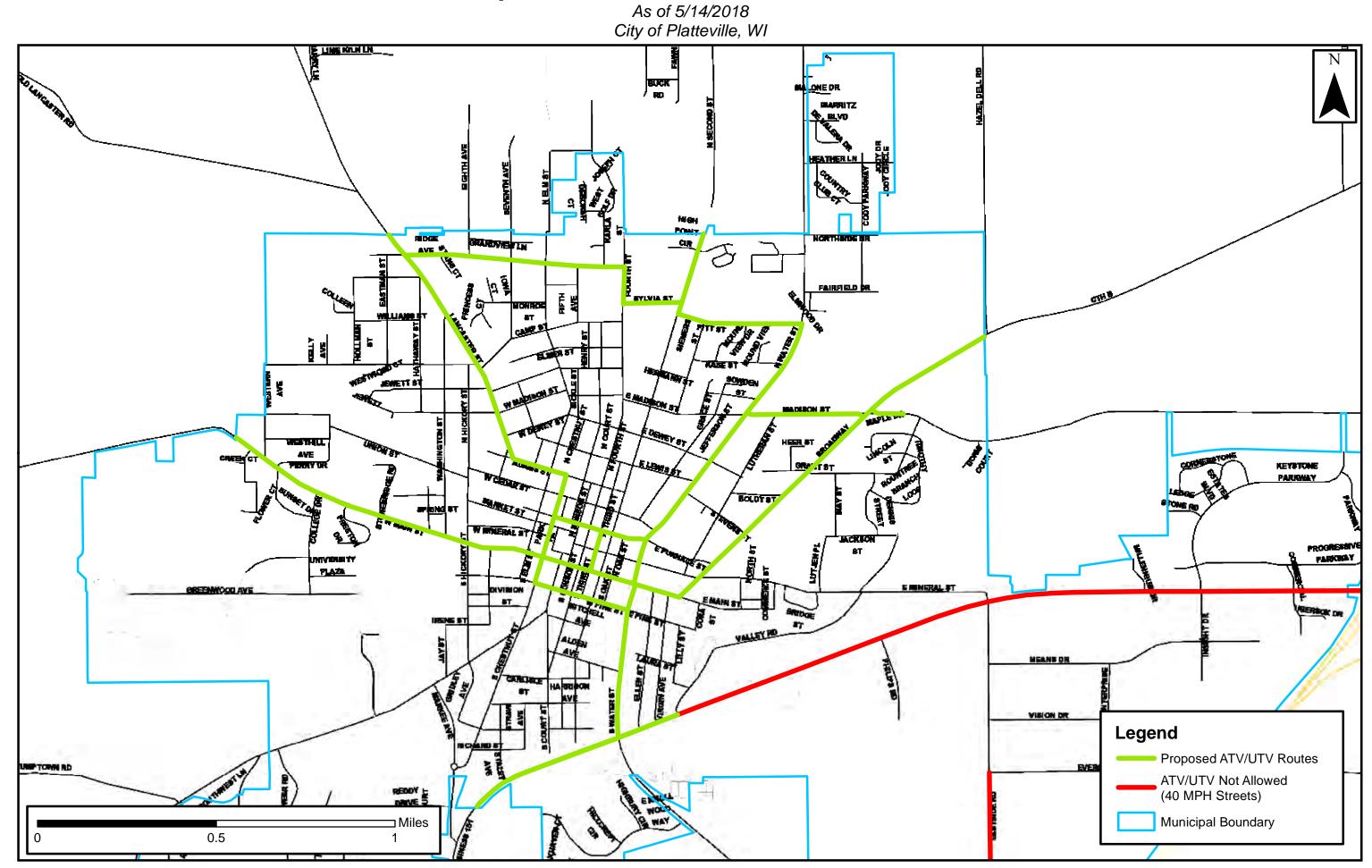

ORDINANCE NO. 18-07

ORDINANCE CREATING SECTION 38.17 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF PLATTVILLE

The Common Council of the City of Platteville, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 38.17 ATVs/UTVs Permitted on Designated Routes in the City of Platteville is hereby created as follows:

38.17 All-Terrain Vehicles and Utility Terrain Vehicles.

38.17(1) ADOPTION OF STATUTORY PROVISIONS. The provisions of section 23.33 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and subsequent amendments thereto, are hereby incorporated herein by reference as part of this Chapter, except for those provisions therein which conflict with this Chapter.

38.17(2) SAVING CLAUSE. This Chapter shall in no way be deemed to supplant or otherwise invalidate any provision of the state statutes relating to the subject matter hereof. Any person entrusted with the enforcement of this Chapter may, in the exercise of his or her discretion, proceed under applicable state statutes.

38.17(3) SEVERABILITY. Should any provision of this Chapter, or its application to any person or circumstance, be held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions to other persons circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

38.17(4) DEFINITIONS. For purposes of this Chapter, the definitions set forth in section 23.33(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein as reference.

38.17(5) DESIGNATED ROUTES. Except as otherwise specifically provided in Section 23.33 of the Wisconsin Statutes, no person shall operate any all-terrain vehicle ("ATV") or utility terrain vehicle ("UTV") upon any public right-of-way or on any other public property in the City of Platteville except as hereinafter designated.

- A. ATVs and UTVs are permitted on the following streets, which are hereby designated all-terrain vehicle routes:
 - 1. Description of ATV/UTV route.
 - 2. ATV/UTV Route.
 - 3. ATV/UTV Route.
 - 4. ATV/UTV Route.
 - 5. ATV/UTV Route.

B. ATVs and UTVs are not allowed to park in or along any roadways, alleyways or public parking lots within the City of Platteville between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.

38.17(6) ROUTE SIGNS. Under the direction of the City, all ATV/UTV routes shall be designated by route signs. The route signs shall be provided by the ATV/UTV Club, or its successor, and shall be installed by the Public Works Department, in accordance with Chapter 23.33(8)(e) of the Wisconsin Administrative Code. The route signs shall be inspected by the City annually and shall be maintained by the ATV/UTV Club, or its successor. The City shall be promptly notified by the ATV/UTV Club of any change in responsibility for maintenance of ATV/UTV route signs.

38.17(7) In addition to the provisions of Wisconsin Statute 23.33, the following restrictions are placed on the use of the City ATV/UTV routes designated by this ordinance:

A. The operators of ATVs/UTVs on all designated ATV/UTV routes shall observe the posted roadway speed limits.

B. ATV/UTV operators shall drive in the center of their lane of travel.

C. All ATV/UTV operators shall ride in single file.

D. All ATV/UTV headlamps and tail lamps must be turned on at all times.

E. All UTV operators and passengers must wear seat belts at all times.

F. The City of Platteville routes will be closed from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.

G. The City of Platteville routes will be closed from December 1st to March 15th.

H. The City of Platteville may close ATV/UTV routes at any time through removal of all route signage and by providing notice to the public.

I. ATVs/UTVs are prohibited from operating on any recreation trails in the City.

J. No person may operate an ATV/UTV that is constructed in such a manner that noise emitted from the vehicle exceeds 96 decibels.

K. No open intoxicants are allowed while operating on, or as a passenger in, any ATV/UTV in the City.

L. All Wisconsin Statutes related to the operation of an ATV/UTV while under the influence of alcohol or a restricted controlled substance will be strictly enforced, including Absolute Sobriety by ATV/UTV operators under the age of 21.

M. ATV/UTV operators shall possess a valid operator's license as defined in section 340.01(41g) of the Wisconsin Statutes, as may be amended from time to time.

N. No person may operate an ATV/ UTV within the City of Platteville unless the owner or operator of the vehicle has in effect, a liability policy covering the vehicle being operated and such operator has in his or her immediate possession a certificate or proof of insurance covering such vehicle which shall be displayed upon demand from any traffic officer.

38.17(8) CLOSURES, SUSPENSION, OR TERMINATION OF ROUTE. The Common Council President shall have the authority to:

- (1) Temporarily close any all all-terrain route designated herein for a period of sixty (60) days or less due to an emergency, complaint, or other necessary condition as determined by the Common Council.
- (2) Request the Common Council to review any ATV/UTV route designated herein for the purpose of suspending or terminating the route.

38.17(9) ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES. Violations of this Chapter shall incur a forfeiture as follows:

A. Violations of section 38.17(1) – As set forth in section 23.33(13) of the Wisconsin Statutes, as may be amended from time to time.

B. Violations of section 38.17(5)B -- \$20.00

C. All other violations of this Chapter – As set forth in section 10.7 of this Code.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

Frequently Asked Questions Regarding ATV/UTV Use Within the City of Platteville Updated June 22, 2018

Q: What are the licensing requirement to operate on routes within the City of Platteville? The City of Platteville would require in its ordinances that individuals have a valid Wisconsin Driver's License when using a City of Platteville ATV/UTV route. This requirement would be in addition to existing requirements under state regulations:

- Anyone born after Jan. 1, 1988 must have a valid ATV safety certificate issued by WI or another state or province of Canada.
- Operators of UTV's must be 16 years old. Operators of ATV's must be at least 12 years old and supervised by an adult. Supervision includes having an adult as a passenger on the ATV or an adult riding in close proximity to the supervised ATV operator.

Q; Since the ATV/UTVs would be driven on city streets, are the drivers treated the same as automobile drivers? ATV/UTV drivers are generally expected to follow the same driving rules as an automobile driver. However, a different state statute governs ATV/UTVs and not all of the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Code (Chapter 346) apply to ATV/UTVs. The City has the option of addressing specific issues or violations in the ordinance authorizing ATV/UTV use.

Q: Who has right of way when ATV/UTVs interact with bicyclists and pedestrians?

When traveling on designated routes in the City, ATV/UTVs would have the same duty to yield to pedestrians as other motor vehicles (autos, trucks etc.) do. The same responsibilities to yield to bicyclists as appropriate would also apply to ATV/UTVs.

Q; How would common Moving Violations be handled? The following citations are frequently written in Platteville. The bond amounts for operating a motor vehicle and their counterpart if they were written to the operator of an ATV/UTV are listed below. Many specific State Statutes under the Motor Vehicle Code (Chapter 346) do not apply for ATV/UTV's so many violations are written under "catch-all" provisions in Chapter 23.33 (as noted by an asterisk after the ATV/UTV bond amount). Specific offenses which the City decides to enforce could be specified in our City Ordinance adopting their use in the City. An example of this would be a prohibition on open intoxicants. Convictions incurred while operating an ATV/UTV are not reflected on a person's motor vehicle driving record.

Q: Does an Operating While Impaired (i.e. drunk driving) conviction incurred while operating an ATV/UTV impact your insurance? This conviction would not go against the individual's Driver's License if they were operating an ATV/UTV which meets the legal definition of an ATV/UTV because ATV/UTVs are considered recreational vehicles similar to boats and snowmobiles. According to American Family Insurance, a conviction for Operating a Motor Vehicle While Under the Influence would negatively impact a person's car insurance since it would be listed on their National Vehicle Report (NVR) database.

Q: Are ATV/UTVs required to have license plates? Are ATV/UTVs searchable in police databases like a licensed automobile? Yes. We can check an ATV/UTV license plate and receive information about the owner including their name and address. Since a driver's license would be required under City ordinances, the police could check information on the driver's record and warrants. ATV/UTVs are required to have a 4" by 7.5" license plate mounted on the rear of the ATV/UTV. The license plate displays a four-number and two-letter registration ID.

Q: Do ATV/UTVs have safety features such as headlights and turning signals? Do riders have to wear helmets? State Statutes require that ATVs are required to have one headlight and one taillight only when operating upon a highway or during hours of darkness. UTVs must be equipped with 2 headlights however only 1 must be working. UTVs must have one operational taillight. Turn signals are not currently required for ATV/UTVs. Some ATV/UTVs are equipped with turn signals. In lieu of turn signals, the operators of ATV/UTVs are required to use hand signals to notify others of their intention to make a turn. ATVs are not required to have brake lights. UTVs are required to have one operational brake light.

ATV/UTV operators and passengers under the age of 18 are required to wear protective helmets (DOT approved helmets-bike helmets do not meet this requirement). Operators and passengers over the age of 18 are not required to wear helmets.

Q: What happens when an ATV is found parked in an unauthorized area?

Based on the proposed ordinance, the vehicle would be cited for illegal parking if it's on public property. Chapter 23 of the State Statutes could also apply and the ATV/UTV could be cited for trespassing or operating in an area which is posted closed or where prohibited by law. ATV/UTVs may not operate on private property without the property owner's consent. The citation in this case would be \$232.00. **Q:** What's the fine for an ATV parked on a road that is not a designated route? Or a public parking lot where ATV/UTVs are banned? The fine amount would need to be established by the Common Council or Chapter 23 could apply and the citation amount would be \$232.00.

Q: Can ATVs/UTVs park in any lot? ATVs/UTVs would be allowed in public lots unless specially banned by the Common Council. Private owners have the choice to allow or not allow ATV/UTVs in their lots.

Q: What's the penalty for driver's not having the Safety Certification completed? What's the penalty for not wearing seatbelts? The citation for not having the safety certification completed is \$232.00. The occupants of UTVs are required to wear seatbelts and they're subject to a citation for \$232.00. The driver of a UTV is not required to wear a seatbelt. The City has the option to require seat belt use in the authorizing ordinance.

Q: How will this impact our Police Department? Other communities have not reported significant enforcement issues. Staff recommends that each police officer attend a 2.5 hour training session with the local DNR Recreational Vehicle Supervisor. This training will cover enforcement under the provisions of Ch. 23.33 which apply to ATVs and UTVs. Staff anticipates questions from both residents who use ATVs and UTVs and those who have questions about the routes until residents become familiar with the rules.

Q: Would dirt bikes be permitted on designated ATV/UTV routes? Trail or dirt bikes are a "limited use off-highway motorcycle" which means an off-highway motorcycle that is not registered by the Dept. of Transportation for highway use. Dirt bikes which are not street legal would NOT be permitted on designated ATV/UTV routes or on other highways or streets. Street legal or dual-sport bikes which are registered by the Dept. of Transportation currently are currently allowed to travel on any highway or street.

Q: Will it affect my vehicle insurance rates if the community where I live adopts ATV/UTV routes? American Family Insurance was not aware of any impact this would have on the vehicle insurance rates for people living in a community which adopts ATV/UTV routes.

Q: What happens if I'm involved in an accident with an uninsured ATV/UTV while I'm driving my car? This would be handled the same if you were involved in an accident with an uninsured car or truck. If you carry uninsured/underinsured motorist coverage, your insurance would take care of the damages and your insurance company would seek to recover any appropriate damages in civil court. If you do not carry this coverage, your insurance company would cover your damages and they would seek to recover any loss through civil court if the other driver were deemed to be at fault. The same applies if the other vehicle in the accident in the accident was an ATV or UTV.

The proposed ordinance in Platteville would require ATV/UTV operators to have proof of insurance while traveling in the city.

• I am particularly opposed to allowing them on Furnace St between Water and Broadway. This is a residential street that would suffer from the additional noise and traffic.

- Frankly, this is a thinly veiled attempt to circumvent drinking and driving. no one wants drunk ATVer's ripping up 2nd street, main street, and major highways through town. don't be (word omitted- inappropriate language) dostupid.
- I feel that it proposed on too many streets where there is already a lot of traffic. There are too many rules that don't apply to them but do apply to other vehicles.
- Ridge Ave already has considerable traffic including semis, agriculture vehicle, horse and buggy, and is the "short cut" across town. Including probably some of the heaviest volume of biking and walking traffic.
- One of the routes runs right by my house. We chose this area of town to live because it's quiet. It won't be quiet with UTV & ATV traffic at all hours.
- And with the new bike path, is no longer a wide street.
- I do not support the routes. I am ok with them, but that does not equate to support.
- Allow on all streets and expand to more recreational vehicles. Aka, golf carts. I want to take an electric golf cart from my house to Piggly for errands.
- I am open to look at options. And test things out for two years and make adjustments
- ATVs are designed for off road use. They have no crash protection for the occupants. No bumpers, no air bags, no anti-locking braking systems. The proposal has them in the lane at the posted speed which is of great risk to all. The noise of an ATV at the posted will be well over any level that is acceptable in a city. There is little upside to this proposal to the residents of the city but significant downside and increased risk.
- Main street being 2 ways is already bad enough. Entering Main Street from a side street can be difficult at times. Adding UTV's just add to the problem. Cars parked close to the corners are the biggest problem.
- I would love to see it expand! As well as expand to snowmobiles.
- Pick not busy streets.
- I don't believe you should be running the route on Lancaster St. it is highway and a very busy.
- I think if you are going to have routes, which we should...why are you not allowing the residents that aren't on these routes direct access to them?
- I think that the routes should try to avoid destinations that would encourage 12-16-year old to use ATV/UTVs as primary means of transportation. Specifically, the high school should be excluded if possible, as should access to Platteville's public pool.
- I feel there are areas that do not allow adequate distance to see a lower profile vehicle such as an ATV. I am concerned someone will injured.
- Nor any other routes.
- I fear for their visibility and wonder if this passes with snow mobiles be next? There's just too much traffic for these types of vehicles in town.
- I do not want this to come through the city at all. I completely oppose this.

- I would not support ATV/UTV routes that would pass thru Mound View Park, and any other trails established by the Arboretum that are meant for walk, bike, ski only.
- I support, the routes but am interested in the impact of traffic. I feel a few of these roads may be congested with ATV/car/bike and pedestrian traffic.
- Not downtown, not on ridge/Sylvia/Pitt which are residential areas and near parks due to noise and children.
- I have viewed the proposed route map and DO NOT support these vehicles nears schools, churches, recreations areas (pools) or other common areas where Platteville city residents have fought so hard over the past to secure such areas for enjoyment, relaxation and place of -worship.
- If we have to have them, these are as limited as they should be to get people out to regular out of town ATV routes.
- I do not like the idea of routes going past the schools, or the main parks and pool. Too many kids during the summer that could be hit by a ATV that they didn't see.
- All city streets and trails should be open to ATV/UTV use.
- I am unclear why we would want ATVs on the streets. It sounds like an unsafe proposal which adds more risk to travelers and little benefit.
- I live 2 blocks off the route. Would I be able to drive my UTV to the route as long as I'm going directly from my driveway to the route, or vice versa?
- Roads are too busy. It will be too dangerous. If these vehicles are on the roads are they going to pay the wheel tax!!! They should!!

Some businesses will benefit at the sake of the overall community as it will reduce quality of life for residents.

 Why? So, a few businesses can benefit? Shameful
- Allow access to service stations-somewhat from North to east- EZ shop, from the South Kwik trip, from North and West Jeffs LOCO, but not routes through the city, let them go around.
- Not in town
- Very dangerous for Ridge Ave We have several skate board, large farm equipment on street. Cars have to stop if they meet one. Farm truck equipment takes the width of street. Then we have 7 small children in one block walking, playing, bikes – too dangerous for all. Walkers, cars can't get out of driveway.
- Limit to Memorial Day through Labor Day only during daylight hours.
- I would love to see this become all roads. As well as the hours expanded. It would be great if this expanded to allow snowmobiles in town as well.
- If the city is going to think about this, they need to put a wheel tax on the vehicles and make anyone driving to pass a test to drive one and license there rides. We have a license to ride motorcycle, they should have to have one also. And they also need to have insurance coverage. You should also have an age limit on the drivers.
- I am fine with the city offering limited routes that take operators to and from off-road trail access. Caution is needed so that ATV/UTVs do not become the primary means of transportation for adolescents.

- At least not on city routes. these vehicles should remain off roads.
- You will probably hear from people who are living a block or so away from the trails who would have to trailer them to the trails to use them.

Given that, why increase traffic congestion along the already congested main thoroughfares as well as increasing noise by allowing ATV/UTVs to be used on the Streets.

- Ridge Ave already has a bike path that was NOT supported by residents. With the added bikers, joggers and young families an ATV/UTV route would be just downright dangerous. Looking at the map there is no reason for the route to go on Ridge Ave. There are no businesses on this route. It would only be a cut across to nowhere as it goes to Water Street then south to the businesses. Let it go directly to downtown. ATV/UTV traffic will be primarily bar traffic in my opinion. Keep it out of the residential areas.
- Since we have the University here in Platteville (which we are very fortunate to have), I do not think we need the ATV/UTV traffic/income. I have nothing against the ATV/UTVs, EXCEPT, leave our city the way it is now. Do the ATV and UTV have to be licensed?
- If recreational vehicles were allowed to use city streets, they should be subject to all the rules that apply to other motor vehicles: safety belts, insurance, turn signals. It is especially troubling that they are not required to carry insurance.
- I hope the city opens ATV/UTV routes in Platteville. I strongly believe it will bring a positive economic impact to town.
- I don't see a problem and have witnessed other communities enhance their commerce. It will bring Platteville additional revenue. The folks who are complaining won't be affected. It is imagined.
- Noise of the ATV/UTVs are very loud
- ATV/UTV's will be using the same roads that bigger, heavier & louder vehicles already use so I do not understand why some residents feel that it would be more dangerous for our community or put our city residents in any danger. I feel it will benefit our community tremendously.
- I think it's about time that Platteville allowed ATV/UTV traffic. This industry is growing exponentially every year and allowing riders to visit Platteville will increase the number of visitors to our city which directly impacts local businesses.
- My concerns are will they be required to have insurance, to be licensed and will they be required to have lights and follow traffic laws.
- Enough traffic safety problems with mopeds and bicycles. The ATVs and UTVs would go too far. Do more to make the community safer for motorists and pedestrians.
- I think this would good for Platteville. I understand there is some give and take between the 2 parties, but I think our counsel is to close minded.
- Will any of the routes connect to trail that leads to Belmont trail?

- The City of Platteville historically has accommodated all forms of transportation: vehicles, bikes, walking, etc. It would be a shame to not accommodate this form of transportation just because those who are making the decision are not familiar with it.
- I believe it is completely unnecessary to have these routes thru town. There are enough car and moped accidents. I don't believe it is smart to add more congestion to the road ways.
- I see no reason for city streets to be open to ATVs.
- I feel that the routes are the main thing I don't like as well as the fact there is no insurance needed for them. Who is responsible when there is an accident? I feel there needs more restrictions within the city limits.
- No.
- We own multiple ATV's, no UTV. I like the idea as long as it is regulated correctly. I do feel it could be helpful to businesses in the town.
- It's not always about, "The Money". How about we just strive to have a nice, pleasant, quiet town.
- I know that other areas have supported ATV routes. However, we are not the same type of city as Shullsburg or Fennimore. We have much more foot and vehicle traffic. We have a lively downtown and many sporting events around the Pool and Legion Park area. I am totally opposed to recreational vehicles driving in business areas and near recreational parks. ATVs are not regularly used for the singular purpose of transportation. These are recreational vehicles. They do not belong in a city. Neighborhood children should be able to be free from encounters with ATVs and Business traffic should not be hindered by recreational vehicles. I am also opposed to the additional noise pollution these vehicles would bring. I do not want to sit in a park and have my experience marred by additional noise. I also do not want an increase in drunk driving hazards from these vehicles. Many people have hobbies and interested that are not provided in Platteville. Travel to participate in activities is common. I am vehemently opposed to ATV routes in Platteville. Think about the aspect of students bringing ATVs with them to UWP. Campus and surrounding areas will be torn up with illegal usage of the vehicles. We already have drunk students running through our yards at night. This is a terrible idea. Please oppose this idea now!
- ATVs are unsafe and not made for use on city streets. Any violation does not go on the driver's license, so that's a loophole that ATV users will take advantage of. Ridge Avenue just got a bike lane, and now these will be on it? That's bad planning. Does the left hand know what the right hand is doing? The routes go by two schools and the university. That does not make sense. Platteville is not this type of city. It's too big and has a university.
- No.
- Bring it on.

- The corner of Ridge Ave and 4th St is ALREADY dangerous for vehicles, bikes, and those walking. Adding even more traffic will just increase this danger to all involved. The number of near accidents daily is already way too high on a corner with horrible visibility and vehicles that ho WAY to fast. Moving this route one street over to Camp St turning onto 4th St would make much more sense due to increased visibility for both vehicles and those walking/riding bikes and stop signs causing slower speeds.
- Not in town.
- ATVs are not designed for road use, and are more likely to roll over on the smooth surface. I am okay with a route that came up to city limits, but think it's a disaster waiting to happen within the city limits. I think there are a lot of unknowns and misinformation out there on the topic. Is the city looking to require a " trail pass" to ride through?
- This isn't a small town like some of the other towns that have these routes. I would be very concerned about safety. Some of these routes are heavily traveled by regular traffic, bikes, joggers/walkers.
- Hours should be based on daylight hours, not specific times. Use official sunrise/sunset as the guide.
- Noise and flow traffic.
- A lot of talk. Just make the ATVs install turn signals and register with the DMV or city. Expand to all streets. ATVs can follow the same road laws as normal vehicles.
- I think ATV users have the same capacity to accidentally harm someone in a motorized vehicle, but they are not held to as high of standards. I think it is a dangerous choice and does not benefit our community. I strongly oppose this.
- Picking the streets thru the city is hard. I think that aspect needs to be looked at more closely. But I am very open to finding a way to representing all community members in this. I am by no means an avid ATV/UTV user in fact I am a cyclist/runner and all about silent sports but who am I to limit my community members in enjoying their recreation. Would I want to see them on any of the trails in town, absolutely no. The path to Belmont absolutely not. As a community I feel we need to all make an effort to help each other out. Try to make it work. This will in no way help my business. It may however help others. In two years if it has not worked so well and the authorities cannot seem to maintain safety then pull it out of the community.
- The proposed trail route is on streets used by a lot of semi-trailers. If ATVs are used on the same street, I foresee horrible complications. I also believe that it is a way that people will drink and drive as it will not count against their license. Are there not enough drinking and driving deaths already with regular automobiles in Wisconsin. What is the possible benefit of this? Making money? Is that better than public safety? Especially by Neal Wilkins Schools?
- There are numerous studies out that show that it is not appropriate to have ATV use on paved streets through towns. You are going to have children under driving age

operating ATV's that do not have the maturity and developmental cognition to be operating around cars and pedestrian traffic. For example, see www.governing.com/topics/public-justice-safety/gov-roads-atvs-fatalities.html. Once you open them up to our public roads, it will be very hard to go back, or replace lost human cost. The tourists who come now, and who are the kind we really want to attract, will be turned off by turning our town into one where ATVs are whizzing down the streets. We want a classy town. PLEASE don't allow this to pass!!!

- This is a bad idea. These vehicles should not be used within the city limits.
- What are the reasons for suggesting ATV/UTV use in Platteville? if it for revenue, my guess would be that the bus would be the business serving the ATV/UTV drivers. These same patrons. after visiting the bars, will hop back in those vehicles, plus be driving on our city streets. This is concerning, we have so many children in our community. in the area of the proposed routes that will be affected by this additional traffic. It is a worry.
- Ridge Ave The street is not strong enough to hold all. As the last concrete in street was bad, this is breaking up, after just two years. Very dangerous for Ridge Ave.
- We already have all of the cement trucks, excavation equipment, and everyone who drives to Menard's/Aldi/Walmart, etc. driving down Broadway. There are small children walking unattended to NWilkins. It is already one of the noisiest streets in town. Let's share the love and send traffic to some of the richer parts of town.
- This will open the city to significant risk that has no upside. I do not see any reason to allow this traffic for getting fuel, ATVs hold a lot of fuel and we don't have off road trails where one would run out of gas. Promoting ATVs to get to bars is a step in the wrong direction. This will open up a huge can of worms for the city for the benefit of a few.
- I don't want the noise & traffic & DUST/MUD they create. Pitt & Sylvia Streets have a lot of traffic already in the summer...making it less safe.
- This proposal is requesting permission for lawful drivers to operate ATV/UTV vehicles which are not that dissimilar than a motorcycle. Let's get the decision made; please stop wasting taxpayer time and money. Look to the data from other successful communities.
- If the city does decide to go ahead, I would hope it would be very limited routes that will be re-evaluated after a few months. My overall opinion however is still that this will create more problems and dangers than benefits.
- Are ATVs required to have insurance? Even though the ordinance states that ATV/UTVs would be prohibited from operating on recreational trails I am concerned that this would be an issue.
- Safety around parks, schools, Legion Field, etc. should be the council's utmost importance not economics. This is horrible. Do not vote for this.
- I live along one of the proposed routes. I do not like ATV's; they will add noise and chaos to my street and to neighborhoods that I frequent; even if there isn't a dramatic increase in ATV's on my street they will create more chaos than there currently is and I don't want that. When I visit Eagle River in northern Wisconsin in the winter there is a

constant buzz of snowmobiles and this disrupts my enjoyment of being there. ATV's similarly offer pleasure to some while taking away from the safety and peace for me and my family. Further, we all know that sunset clauses don't work. Once something has begun it is significantly more difficult to end, even if many people don't like it. ATV's are built for recreation and they are welcome to do this, just not on my street.

- I am very concerned about people being able to legally to operate ATV/ATV on city streets without proof of insurance. I am also concerned about people being allowed to legally drive an ATV/UTV on City streets after a driver's license suspension or revocation.
- Yes, I talked to someone in Potosi who as ATV route behind their house. When the ATV's go by you cannot hear the TV in the home. I talked with someone in Lancaster and the 1st word out of their mouth was "they just go to drink" (the person did not even hear what I was going to say). Drinking and motorized vehicles are very bad. I live at the corner of 4th ridge. There are LOTS of little kids going that way to the pool/park/middle school. that is NOT safe for them. I have lived in Platteville since 1982 and the city/county has done fine without an ATV route in the city.
- This will bring a lot of money to the city of Platteville.
- This proposal simply does not make sense in an urban area. When an All-Terrain Vehicle enters into a city, in particular around children at parks, I see it is a noisy, dangerous proposal that has no place in this community. Please do not approve any of these city routes.
- Nope.
- I would like to see stricter or more severe penalties for ATV/UTV use concerning alcohol violations. I also have concerns about crashes and automobiles and these ATVs/UTVs not needing insurance.
- I think parking should be eliminated on the east side of fourth street from the pool maintenance driveway to where 4th turns into Ridge Ave. Traveling north the corner is too narrow when cars are parked on 4th Street.
- Please hear that what is being discussed is ultimately a privilege and a recreational activity, not a right or necessity. With this privilege comes limitations, and unfortunately that is the reality. I'm not saying that we shouldn't have this, but we also need to smart, responsible, and respectful about it. We need to take the time to educate the community and create the strongest case possible backed by research to do this right. Just because other communities have made this work, doesn't mean it can be generalized to all other communities. We have responsibility as recreational vehicle enthusiasts to put in the work to educate the public, and not expect that everyone should just understand where we are coming from. As soon as we lose awareness of this being a privilege, it can lead to a feeling of entitlement, which then can ultimately lead to greed. The greedier we become, the more we become our own worst enemy in advocating for our sport. I'm this process let's take some time to check our own privilege and assess if it is helping or hurting. Using the argument that spending 15 20k

on a vehicle that is a luxury and not a necessity makes us entitled to using it however we want probably isn't the best PR approach. It's my choice to spend my money on a recreational vehicle, and it is not fair for me expect others to feel sympathy for me when I don't want to accept the limitations that come with it. The most frustrating part of being involved in the recreational vehicle community since I started many years ago is the sense of entitlement that basically leads us to shooting ourselves in the foot. It is our responsibility to work to be stronger and more respectful advocates of the sport we so truly enjoy!

- Routes should be different and not near kids/ school zones/ bike routes/ safe routes. Only allow during summer time, bad idea for college and high school kids to be drinking during academic year.
- Many.
- I mentioned comments throughout the survey.
- I see this being a very positive thing to bring to Platteville.
- Looking forward to this being allowed in Platteville.
- I am VERY glad the proposed ordinance includes the following: operator's minimum age of 16 years, valid driver's license requirement, seat belt requirement for passengers AND operators, and restrictions on open intoxicants and operating while under the influence. I would NOT be in support of this if any of them were not included.
- Main street is already difficult to navigate especially when coming from a side street like the one-way from the Mound City bank drive-through. Trying to see around parked cars and vehicles going faster than speed limit on Main makes it hard to see regular vehicles, let alone ATVs Madison St has heavy school traffic and should be considered limited to summer only if at all. The first accident involving an ATV that results in injury or death of an ATV occupant will bring liability claims against the city for unsafe routes. I understand attracting tourism, but these are recreation vehicles intended for recreational use, not street use. There has to be a way to allow the ATV community to reach recreational areas without traveling on heavy traffic streets. It is about all people's safety, including ATV users, both local and tourists.
- I do not support the idea of ATV/UTV use in the city. These vehicles are not appropriate in terms of safety for our city and while many would, I do not believe that the users of the vehicles would consistently make good choices. I envision a Friday night with school in session and people ripping off from Second Street drunk and dangerous to themselves and pedestrians. This would diminish the character of our town and make Platteville a less desirable place to live.
- Do they have turn signal? The noise they make, racing on roads, drinking and driving. they are off roads vehicles. Are you taking taxes off people who live on these routes? Do they carry insurance, are they licensed? Will they be drinking in our parks and ripping up the grass? Will they be fined if there in town after 11:00 pm driving or at the bars?

- The police dep can't or won't do anything about cars and diesel straight pipe trucks on Broadway now.
- Does it really matter?
- Who's going to patrol these areas?
- Why is the city so averse to change when it does not directly benefit the university?
- As a resident on one of the proposed routes, we already live with a continuous stream of trucks, semis, motorcycles, cars, quarry trucks, etc. 24 hours a day. The summer that we had construction in front of our house for several months was actually the quietest summer we've ever had in this house, because 7a-8p construction was quieter and more limited than our normal traffic. This is also a route with pedestrians, including school children, runners, and bicyclists. Any increase in traffic affects the safety of all.
- There are no she restrictions on the operation of vehicles within City limits. According to state law children 12 years or older can operate the vehicle. I strongly disagree with allowing young children to operate motor vehicles on city roads with normal traffic.
- Noise, drinking and driving (safety), increased traffic, stress on infrastructure, stress on law enforcement.
- This is a horrible idea. These vehicles are loud and unsafe for city streets. This is a regressive proposal. Please do not approve it.
- We should be expanding waking/booking routes, not ATV routes.
- Concerned about enforcement of routes and proximity of University to some routes. Doesn't seem like a great idea with the large university population-the age group isn't always the most respectful of property. Also have questions about entry routes into City? I also am not in favor of routes that go primarily through residential neighborhoods.
- What are benefits of doing this? do they outweigh the safety concerns? Is there another city with similar population that has done this? How many accidents? complaints?
- I'm very concerned about the following: a) ATVs are not safe to operate on roads they are off-road vehicles. The Yamaha owner's manual for the Warrior YFM 350XS(C) specifically states that it is "unsafe to operate this vehicle on any public street, road, or highway" I'm reasonably certain we could look at many more owner's manuals to see the same statement. They are not designed for use on paved roads. Why are we even considering this when the manufacturers state the safety concerns quite clearly? b) School route safety. There is a lot of potential for interference of ATVs/UTVs with school traffic and hazards to students walking to/from school. If this ultimately is approved, then there should be prohibitions against their use in school zones during start/dismissal times (as has been regulated in other WI cities), as well in areas where we know there are a lot of students crossing roads. c) Noise levels. Platteville has high quality of life due to its being quiet. We live one row of houses from Main Street on the west side of town; unless ATVs/UTVs are quieter than the Amish riding their buggies through town, I frankly don't care to hear them in my neighborhood at night. I could

somewhat understand proposed routes to allow people to pass through the town, but I see absolutely no need to encourage recreational driving around town in vehicles that are NOT DESIGNED FOR CITY STREETS. I admit great difficulty in understanding why there is a need for this - we don't allow snowmobiles or horses (except for the Amish) on our city streets. What benefit is there to the larger community? What is the demand underlying this proposal? Why are we disregarding the inherent safety concerns as expressed by the manufacturers themselves?

- I do not want this use to be allowed in the city.
- I think it's a dumb idea!! We have enough vandalism and theft going on now there is no since of adding more!! Plus are there going to be more police add to shifts to patrol the speeding and drinking. It's been witness the drinking and speeding in the country by many!! AND if more officers are needed is it going to reflect on our taxes! If the city wants this then THEY should be responsible for EVERYTHING not us tax payers!!!
- I am very concerned for the safety of pedestrians and motorists. I am extremely concerned for the safety of children walking and riding bikes on our city streets with ATV/UTVs on those same streets.
- Routes do NOT positively affect businesses other than taverns or gas stations. The majority of ATV riders don't use them to gain access to shops or other retail places.
- Driving in the dark and not having proper lights to be seen by anyone. They should not be allowed in the dark (there's a reason by bicyclists choose daylight hours). Driver's under the influence of alcohol or drugs Pedestrian safety If anyone can have one, and they are allowed to take the most direct route the designated routes, doesn't that mean that every road can be driven on? Driver's not following the rules of the road Does the city get any money from ATV/UTV users for using the roads? Some roads could get extra worn from the tires. Maybe a registration fee should be created. These are off-road vehicles not created for on-road use -- that makes them dangerous. The Department of Transportation does not recognize these are roadworthy vehicles: Why should our city? We should choose the possibility of money for some businesses over the safety of all? - It needs more input from everyone before this is enacted. Are there some moving violations that don't go on a user's driver's license? During the school year, there's too much traffic (car, bike, pedestrian) and that makes this addition to the streets unsafe for everyone.
- There have been concerns raised about other university cities having these. Platteville is unique as it is in a relatively rural community. Allow passage to and through our community will allow people to take advantage of the rural area even more. People from more urban areas may consider coming to Platteville to travel the area, stay in Platteville hotels, eat in Platteville restaurants etc. The draw with these units are not to drive around town, but to drive through or to businesses while also accessing trails in the county. I think this is very positive. I think that the Council should be mindful of over regulating at first and watch for issues that pop up and regulate only when it is apparent

that it is needed. A lot of emphasis is put on alcohol consumption and rightly so, these issues can be addressed with regulation from the start and have already been addressed by open intoxicants ordinances in Platteville.

- Don't understand a need for this in Platteville. Routes involve areas highly used by children and families (Smith Park. Aquatic center, and Legion Field) which brings safety concerns. These are off road vehicles by design, what is their purpose in the city? Also concerned about increased traffic noise by elderly residential and nursing facilities, increased work load on police department to monitor appropriate usage and adherence to laws. Especially concerned about community impact when 4000+ college students return in the fall. Are they going to bring ATV's with them, ride them in town, who is going to monitor them? Main street is high traffic and limited parking, limited parking/storage if students bring in trailers will be taking up 4 parking spaces on the streets.
- I think this would be an enforcement nightmare for the police department and the city.
- Just keep the routes away from the existing Arboretum trails and city parks.
- I have very serious concerns over the age of ATV/UTV drivers on any city streets. Legal age to drive an ATV is 12 in Wisconsin, if they are not licensed to drive a regular vehicle, how would they comprehend driving with traffic...especially with the semi traffic along Lancaster St, Chestnut, & Water Streets. Personally, I cannot envision a child under 16 handling traffic. Running around on country property and personal property trails are vastly different than being around a semi. What about wheel tax? We pay it on our vehicles, do they have to pay it as well? What about insurance & registration? Are they required to carry the same as regular vehicles? Maybe if these items were addressed, age requirements met, insurance met, etc., I would be in support, but until then, no. I cannot see this being a safe addition to our city.
- Safety concerns. With added college traffic, it's an accident waiting to happen. Hard to see ATV's, especially for semi's. Add to that the starting age for ATV drivers, we'd have 14-year old on the city street, operating motor vehicles. ATV Club is not a non-profit--so why is the city putting in the signs for them at taxpayer cost? For the limited amount of people that will benefit from this, VERY few that are tax- payers for the city, I think it is a not a necessary addition for the city.
- I feel to be inclusive to all, consideration should be given to the ATV users to access our community.
- ATV/UTV use should not be allowed in Platteville. They are a nuisance, they obstruct traffic, they bring very little business to the area except for a couple gallons of gas and a beer or two. They tend to gang up and ignore traffic rules. What's the point? We've got enough horse manure on the streets now.
- Platteville PD rarely stops loud trucks and motorcycles screaming through neighborhoods especially on north 2nd St. This is going to make our neighborhoods even louder.

- Noise, filth, obnoxious behavior, crowding, parking and traffic issues. All around bad for the city.

- I live on Water Street, one of the proposed routes. My house went unsold for one year mainly because of the volume of noise from the high truck and auto traffic on Water Street, a state highway. This will increase the noise and the traffic. Installing a lane just for ATV/UTV would reduce the space available and necessary for safe passage of large trucks and farm equipment. I assume this would also involve "No Parking" signs will be added on the proposed lane, a big inconvenience for residents along Water Street. How will the ATV/UTV drivers access the trail from outside the city limits? Do they break the law and travel on an unmarked roadway into the city? Who will enforce this boundary? It's my understanding drivers as young as 12 years old could be operating these vehicles. This is unsafe and dangerous. Are the operators required to carry insurance and register their vehicles? This will create and additional enforcement burden on our police dept.
- I support this because of the community we live in and the proposed rules seem fair.
- No, should not pass.
- I am concerned with how this will impact the safety of roads. While I understand that if
 they operate on city roads they are held to the laws governing those but what happens
 if an officer notices a violation and then the ATV is on the private trail? Can an officer
 still give a citation with the same consequence? Or will we now have ATVs racing to a
 trail to avoid consequences? Will they ATVs be registered with license plates so you can
 track them down if they flee? I understand the appeal of this for businesses to make
 money but as a mother and frequent pedestrian I worry about how this will impact our
 community. I was once asked what I would like to see Platteville be...a safe community
 that is family friendly. I do not see ATV routes through town as either. We need to be
 focusing on attracting families to our community and I strongly believe this will
 negatively impact our ability to do that which will then have long term consequences for
 our community, especially businesses.
- I feel every street should be open.
- ATV/UTV are off road vehicles. They are too loud and too dangerous for city streets. They're not even licensed to drive on city streets. Next people will be wanting snowmobiles going through town. You are also purposing this next to an elementary school. I worry enough about my children on Broadway. Safety is always number 1 and this is not safe! I do not support this at all!

- Why are we purposing are routes when we don't have bicycle routes/bike lanes? Bicycles are quiet and don't pollute and don't take up parking spaces especially downtown. We should encourage people to bike

This proposal brings a hopeful impact to businesses in the area and makes our city more visitor and citizen friendly. If noise is the main concern against these ATVs/UTVs, please consider new ordinances to ban all motorcycles.
- I am a farm kid and grew up with ATVs as well as trail ride. They are engineered for earth terrain and not asphalt or cement. They don't handle the same and can be squarely. I assure you that someone will get injured riding busy streets.

- This is not good for the people who live in town. Who is this plan aimed at? Who is to benefit and at whose expense?
- I like the approach to getting the community's opinion.
- None, let get this thing going.
- I do not want them zipping by streets that have parks or the pool. Asking for trouble.
- This is a growing recreational activity in WI, with significant increases seen in SW WI. Providing thoroughfares through the city will help increase visitors to our community and is an additional form of tourism. Including our community in supporting of this activity should help those businesses along the routes. It may also foster the establishment of businesses supporting this recreational activity outside the city. (e.g. RV parks, additional off-road trails, sales and service facilities, and others catering to UTV/ATV activities).
- As with all vehicle traffic in the City, enforcement is key. My personal experience has been the self-enforcement of this group of enthusiasts. They realize access is a privilege, not a right, and as such will help to self-regulate.
- I am not in favor of opening up city streets to ATV/UTV for the following reasons: 1) The Specialty Vehicle Institute of America, a manufacturers trade group, takes the position that "ATVs are designed, manufactured and sold for off-road use only." 2) Nearly 100,000 people are hurt annually in ATV crashes, according to federal figures. Researchers have found that roadway injuries tend to be more serious than those on forest trails and other off-road locations. 3) WI state law requires ATV drivers to be at least 12 years old and UTV drivers to be at least 16 — and then only after receiving safety certification. I don't believe that 12-year-old children have the capacity to make quick decisions to avoid an accident and we should not put them in a situation where they need to make a decision to either avoid a pedestrian, child crossing the street, bicyclist or a car they didn't see coming. 4) No surface is more dangerous for ATVs than pavement, many road safety authorities say. But across the country, more local and state governments are allowing all-terrain vehicles to be driven on paved roads. 5) The ATV industry opposes driving off-road vehicles on public roadways, cautioning that paved surfaces hamper the machines' handling ability and can cause operators to lose control and crash. Several ATV manufacturers include warnings in their manuals about collisions with other vehicles on public roads. Honda goes so far as to advise riders approaching a paved road to "get off and walk your ATV across." 6) From 2003 to 2013, 13 children have been killed while riding ATVs on public roads in Minnesota. In 150 accidents reviewed by the Star Tribune, 40 percent of the riders were younger than 16 and driving on public roads. In most cases, the children were on ATVs designed for adults — a common practice that has been connected to almost 1,200 U.S. deaths over the past decade. A child riding down a road on an adult-sized ATV embodies the industry's biggest safety concerns, said Tim Buche, president of the Specialty Vehicle Institute of America, an ATV trade group. "If we could change two things, it would be

youth on adult machines and ATVs on roads." 7) The problem, road safety officials say, is that car and truck drivers can have a hard time seeing ATVs, which usually don't have turn signals or rearview mirrors. "Traffic isn't used to ATVs," said Dietrich Flesch, Wabasha County's chief road superintendent who opposed opening the county's road to ATVs. And the machines won't fare well in accidents, he said. "I don't believe they meet any crash standards a car would meet." 8) Many of these streets, Broadway especially, are school children's routes to and from school as they walk or bike to Neal Wilkins to catch shuttle busses to and from other schools in the city. I would be very nervous for students walking home after school, especially as the weather changes and it is darker in the afternoons, even though the ordinance calls for a restriction from December – March. Many times, we have snow in October and this will only increase the probability of accidents with ice and snow. 9) The purpose of town government is to protect public health, safety and welfare of the citizens that call Platteville home. I respectfully ask that this proposal be denied protecting the public health, safety and welfare of all city residents, ATV/UTV riders included.

- One of the routes runs right by my house. We chose this area of town to live because it's quiet. It won't be quiet with UTV/ATV traffic at all hours.
- Allow on all streets and expand to more recreational vehicles. Aka, golf carts. I want to take an electric golf cart form my house to Piggly errands.
- I am open to look at options. And test things out for two years and make adjustments.
- ATVs are designed for off road use. They have no crash protection for the occupants. No bumpers, no air bags, no anti-locking braking systems. The proposal has them in the lane at the posted speed which is of great risk to all. The noise of an ATV at the posted will be well over any level that is acceptable in a city. There is little upside to this proposal to the residents of the city but significant downside and increased risk.
- And with the new bike path, is no longer a wide street.
- Main street being 2 ways is already bad enough. Entering Main Street from a side street can be difficult at times. Adding UTV's just add to the problem. Cars parked close to the corners are the biggest problem.
- I would love to see it expand! As well as expand to snowmobiles.
- Pick not busy streets.
- I don't believe you should be running the route on Lancaster St. it is highway and a very busy.
- I think if you are going to have routes, which we should...why are you not allowing the residents that aren't on these routes direct access to them?
- I think that the routes should try to avoid destinations that would encourage 12-16-year old to use ATV/UTVs as primary means of transportation. Specifically, the high school should be excluded if possible, as should access to Platteville's public pool.
- I feel there are areas that do not allow adequate distance to see a lower profile vehicle such as an ATV. I am concerned someone will injured.
- Nor any other routes.
- I fear for their visibility and wonder if this passes will snow mobiles be next? There's just too much traffic for these types of vehicles in town.
- I do not want this to come through the city at all. I completely oppose this.
- I would not support ATV/UTV routes that would pass thru Mound View Park, and any other trails established by the Arboretum that are meant for walk, bike, ski only.

- Why are not all the municipalities on the map? We live in Smelser township and that is a in the township of Platteville, would like to know what proposal those roads are that give us access into the city of Platteville, need more routes.
- I support, the routes but am interested in the impact of traffic. I feel a few of these roads may be congested with ATV/car/bike and pedestrian traffic.
- Not downtown, not on ridge/Sylvia/Pitt which are residential areas and near parks due to noise and children.
- I have viewed the proposed route map and DO NOT support these vehicles nears schools, churches, recreations areas (pools) or other common areas where Platteville city residents have fought so hard over the past to secure such areas for enjoyment, relaxation and place of -worship.
- If we have to have them, these are as limited as they should be to get people out to regular out of town ATV routes.
- I do not like the idea of routes going past the schools, or the main parks and pool. Too many kids during the summer that could be hit by a ATV that they didn't see.
- All city streets and trails should be open to ATV/UTV use.
- I use my grandparents UTV and would love to see more access.
- Open all streets in the city of Platteville. Otherwise the council is discriminating some businesses.
- I am unclear why we would want ATVs on the streets. It sounds like an unsafe proposal which adds more risk to travelers and little benefit.
- I live 2 blocks off the route. Would I be able to drive my UTV to the route as long as I'm going directly from my driveway to the route, or vice versa?
- It is my opinion that all roads should be open to ATV/UTV traffic if the unit can maintain the posted speed limit. If motorcycles and motor scooters are allowed, there are no reasons to restrict similar type vehicles in anyway. I would like to be able to utilize my vehicle to access Walmart, Dupaco Credit Union, Smart Station, McDonalds, Burger King, A&W, even Mike's ATV on 80/81. I live a short distance from all of these, and can't get to any of them. And, if I want to go to a friend's house? What, I have to park my vehicle on the route closest to my destination and walk the rest of the way? "I'm disabled and can't walk very far." In closing, I support any proposal that improves access, but hope that all limits on use of my motor vehicles will be soon lifted. It is illegal to restrict one because of prejudice against it. - If the city is going to think about this, they need to put a wheel tax on the vehicles and make anyone driving to pass a test to drive one and license there rides. We have a license to ride motorcycle, they should have to have one also. And they also need to have insurance coverage. You should also have an age limit on the drivers.

It would only be a cut across to nowhere as it goes to Water Street then south to the businesses. Let it go directly to downtown.

ATV/UTV traffic will be primarily bar traffic in my opinion. Keep it out of the residential areas.

- Please make this happen.... you will see it will be a good and profitable thing for the city.
- Since we have the University here in Platteville (which we are very fortunate to have), I do not think we need the ATV/UTV traffic/income. I have nothing against the ATV/UTVs, EXCEPT, leave our city the way it is now. Do the ATV and UTV have to be licensed?
- I can see they would need gas, snacks & such but they don't need to be on so so many streets in Platteville, just to a gas station on the edge of town would be fine. Let them go to more rural communities in Grant, Iowa & Lafayette Counties. No insurance required to travel on public roads this is crazy!!!
- Bring people to Platteville. let's give it a try!
- If recreational vehicles were allowed to use city streets, they should be subject to all the rules that apply to other motor vehicles: safety belts, insurance, turn signals. It is especially troubling that they are not required to carry insurance.
- I hope the city opens ATV/UTV routes in Platteville. I strongly believe it will bring a positive economic impact to town.

This would be a great impact for business and tourism for this area as many families we know like to ride trails and enjoy the area scenery and views with family and friends. Just another reason for outdoor recreation in our great rural area.
- I think it's about time that Platteville allowed ATV/UTV traffic. This industry is growing exponentially every year and allowing riders to visit Platteville will increase the number of visitors to our city which directly impacts local businesses.
- Opening up these routes in a city like Platteville would not be a good option. If it was more of an urban environment, I would maybe see a possibility. - I believe it is completely unnecessary to have these routes thru town. There are enough car and moped accidents. I don't believe it is smart to add more congestion to the road ways.
- I see no reason for city streets to be open to ATVs.
- I feel that the routes are the main thing I don't like as well as the fact there is no insurance needed for them. Who is responsible when there is an accident? I feel there needs more restrictions within the city limits.

- We own multiple ATV's, no UTV. I like the idea as long as it is regulated correctly. I do feel it could be helpful to businesses in the town.
- Keep them off road on designated trails.
- It's not always about, "The Money". How about we just strive to have a nice, pleasant, quiet town.
- I know that other areas have supported ATV routes. However, we are not the same type of city as Shullsburg or Fennimore. We have much more foot and vehicle traffic. We have a lively downtown and many sporting events around the Pool and Legion Park area. I am totally opposed to recreational vehicles driving in business areas and near recreational parks. ATVs are not regularly used for the singular purpose of transportation. These are recreational vehicles. They do not belong in a city. Neighborhood children should be able to be free from encounters with ATVs and Business traffic should not be hindered by recreational vehicles. I am also opposed to the additional noise pollution these vehicles would bring. I do not want to sit in a park and have my experience marred by additional noise. I also do not want an increase in drunk driving hazards from these vehicles. Many people have hobbies and interested

that are not provided in Platteville. Travel to participate in activities is common. I am vehemently opposed to ATV routes in Platteville. Think about the aspect of students bringing ATVs with them to UWP. Campus and surrounding areas will be torn up with illegal usage of the vehicles. We already have drunk students running through our yards at night. This is a terrible idea. Please oppose this idea now!

- I think this would be great especially for students to get around town as well as be able to somehow link the routes to the Cheese Head County Trail to get into Darlington/Monroe.
- No.
- So only reason I wouldn't use them is because the tires on them aren't meant for roads. The soft rubber tires don't last long on roads. I think I may use it in winter (if allowed) but I would much prefer if they had some sort of gravel or dirt trail around the city.
- Great plan, very pleased with this proposition.

- No.
- Bring it on.
- I worry about the number of accidents that could occur due to the usage of these vehicles. Platteville streets are sometimes narrow, and with the university being located there, I could see it being a safety concern. I also see many benefits to the use of these vehicles though.
- This could lead to connecting local snowmobile routes as well! That should be considered.
- The corner of Ridge Ave and 4th St is ALREADY dangerous for vehicles, bikes, and those walking. Adding even more traffic will just increase this danger to all involved. The number of near accidents daily is already way too high on a corner with horrible visibility and vehicles that ho WAY to fast. Moving this route one street over to Camp St turning onto 4th St would make much more sense due to increased visibility for both vehicles and those walking/riding bikes and stop signs causing slower speeds.
- Platteville would benefit greatly by opening ATV/UTV routes within the city. Many other cities and towns in our area have already opened trails or entire towns and are seeing the extra commerce and convenience.
- ATVs are not designed for road use, and are more likely to roll over on the smooth surface. I am okay with a route that came up to city limits, but think it's a disaster waiting to happen within the city limits. I think there are a lot of unknowns and misinformation out there on the topic. Is the city looking to require a " trail pass" to ride through?
- This isn't a small town like some of the other towns that have these routes. I would be very concerned about safety. Some of these routes are heavily traveled by regular traffic, bikes, joggers/walkers.

- Hours should be based on daylight hours, not specific times. Use official sunrise/sunset as the guide.
- Noise and flow traffic.
- A lot of talk. Just make the ATVs install turn signals and register with the DMV or city. Expand to all streets. ATVs can follow the same road laws as normal vehicles.
- I think ATV users have the same capacity to accidentally harm someone in a motorized vehicle, but they are not held to as high of standards. I think it is a dangerous choice and does not benefit our community. I strongly oppose this.

I am by no means an avid ATV/UTV user in fact I am a cyclist/runner and all about silent sports but who am I to limit my community members in enjoying their recreation. Would I want to see them on any of the trails in town, absolutely not. The path to Belmont absolutely not. As a community I feel we need to all make an effort to help each other out. Try to make it work. This will in no way help my business. It may however help others. In two years if it has not worked so well and the authorities cannot seem to maintain safety then pull it out of the community.
- The proposed trail route is on streets used by a lot of semi-trailers. If ATVs are used on the same street, I foresee horrible complications. I also believe that it is a way that people will drink and drive as it will not count against their license. Are there not enough drinking and driving deaths already with regular automobiles in Wisconsin. What is the possible benefit of this? Making money? Is that better than public safety? Especially by Neal Wilkins Schools?
- There are numerous studies out that show that it is not appropriate to have ATV use on paved streets through towns. You are going to have children under driving age operating ATV's that do not have the maturity and developmental cognition to be operating around cars and pedestrian traffic. For example, see www.governing.com/topics/public-justice-safety/gov-roads-atvs-fatalities.html. Once you open them up to our public roads, it will be very hard to go back, or replace lost human cost. The tourists who come now, and who are the kind we really want to attract, will be turned off by turning our town into one where ATVs are whizzing down the streets. We want a classy town. PLEASE don't allow this to pass!!!
- I think this would benefit the City of Platteville and its businesses greatly! It would be a shame if it wasn't passed. These are no different than any other mode of transportation and a few idiots in other areas have given them a bad rap because they can't follow rules. That shouldn't hurt all the others that do follow the rules.
- This is a bad idea. These vehicles should not be used within the city limits.
- What are the reasons for suggesting ATV/UTV use in Platteville? if it for revenue, my guess would be that the bus would be the business serving the ATV/UTV drivers. These

same patrons, after visiting the bars, will hop back in those vehicles, plus be driving on our city streets. This is concerning, we have so many children in our community, in the area of the proposed routes that will be affected by this additional traffic. It is a worry.

- Ridge Ave The street is not strong enough to hold all. As the last concrete in street was bad, this is breaking up, after just two years. Very dangerous for Ridge Ave.
- We already have all of the cement trucks, excavation equipment, and everyone who drives to Menard's/Aldi/Walmart. driving down Broadway. There are small children walking unattended to NWilkins. It is already one of the noisiest streets in town. Let's share the love and send traffic to some of the richer parts of town.
- ATVs are unsafe and not made for use on city streets. Any violation does not go on the driver's license, so that's a loophole that ATV users will take advantage of. Ridge Avenue just got a bike lane, and now these will be on it? That's bad planning. Does the left hand know what the right hand is doing? The routes go by two schools and the university. That does not make sense. Platteville is not this type of city. It's too big and has a university.
- This will open the city to significant risk that has no upside. I do not see any reason to allow this traffic for getting fuel, ATVs hold a lot of fuel and we don't have off road trails where one would run out of gas. Promoting ATVs to get to bars is a step in the wrong direction. This will open up a huge can of worms for the city for the benefit of a few.
- I don't want the noise & traffic & DUST/MUD they create. Pitt & Sylvia Streets have a lot of traffic already in the summer...making it less safe.
- We use our ATV/UTV as a vehicle to visit surrounding towns. (like so many towns that are shown on Discover Wisconsin). We stop at eateries and shops. It's so nice to meet new people and see people that we know on the trails. Many communities embrace moving forward. Why don't we?
- This proposal is requesting permission for lawful drivers to operate ATV/UTV vehicles which are not that dissimilar than a motorcycle. Let's get the decision made; please stop wasting taxpayer time and money. Look to the data from other successful communities.
- If the city does decide to go ahead, I would hope it would be very limited routes that will be re-evaluated after a few months. My overall opinion however is still that this will create more problems and dangers than benefits.
- Are ATVs required to have insurance? Even though the ordinance states that ATV/UTVs would be prohibited from operating on recreational trails I am concerned that this would be an issue.
- Safety around parks, schools, Legion Field, etc. should be the council's utmost importance not economics. This is horrible. Do not vote for this.
- I live along one of the proposed routes. I do not like ATV's; they will add noise and chaos to my street and to neighborhoods that I frequent; even if there isn't a dramatic increase in ATV's on my street they will create more chaos than there currently is and I don't want that. When I visit Eagle River in northern Wisconsin in the winter there is a

constant buzz of snowmobiles and this disrupts my enjoyment of being there. ATV's similarly offer pleasure to some while taking away from the safety and peace for me and my family. Further, we all know that sunset clauses don't work. Once something has begun it is significantly more difficult to end, even if many people don't like it. ATV's are built for recreation and they are welcome to do this, just not on my street.

- I am very concerned about people being able to legally to operate ATV/ATV on city streets without proof of insurance. I am also concerned about people being allowed to legally drive an ATV/UTV on City streets after a driver's license suspension or revocation.
- Yes, I talked to someone in Potosi who as ATV route behind their house. When the ATV's go by you cannot hear the TV in the home. I talked with someone in Lancaster and the 1st word out of their mouth was "they just go to drink" (the person did not even hear what I was going to say). Drinking and motorized vehicles are very bad. I live at the corner of 4th ridge. There are LOTS of little kids going that way to the pool/park/middle school. that is NOT safe for them. I have lived in Platteville since 1982 and the city/county has done fine without an ATV route in the city.
- This will bring a lot of money to the city of Platteville.
- This proposal simply does not make sense in an urban area. When an All-Terrain Vehicle enters into a city, in particular around children at parks, I see it is a noisy, dangerous proposal that has no place in this community. Please do not approve any of these city routes.
- Nope.
- I would like to see stricter or more severe penalties for ATV/UTV use concerning alcohol violations. I also have concerns about crashes and automobiles and these ATVs/UTVs not needing insurance.
- I think parking should be eliminated on the east side of fourth street from the pool maintenance driveway to where 4th turns into Ridge Ave. Traveling north the corner is too narrow when cars are parked on 4th Street.
- Please hear that what is being discussed is ultimately a privilege and a recreational activity, not a right or necessity. With this privilege comes limitations, and unfortunately that is the reality. I'm not saying that we shouldn't have this, but we also need to smart, responsible, and respectful about it. We need to take the time to educate the community and create the strongest case possible backed by research to do this right. Just because other communities have made this work, doesn't mean it can be generalized to all other communities. We have responsibility as recreational vehicle enthusiasts to put in the work to educate the public, and not expect that everyone should just understand where we are coming from. As soon as we lose awareness of this being a privilege, it can lead to a feeling of entitlement, which then can ultimately lead to greed. The greedier we become, the more we become our own worst enemy in advocating for our sport. I'm this process let's take some time to check our own privilege and assess if it is helping or hurting. Using the argument that spending 15 20k

on a vehicle that is a luxury and not a necessity makes us entitled to using it however we want probably isn't the best PR approach. It's my choice to spend my money on a recreational vehicle, and it is not fair for me expect others to feel sympathy for me when I don't want to accept the limitations that come with it. The most frustrating part of being involved in the recreational vehicle community since I started many years ago is the sense of entitlement that basically leads us to shooting ourselves in the foot. It is our responsibility to work to be stronger and more respectful advocates of the sport we so truly enjoy!

- Routes should be different and not near kids/ school zones/ bike routes/ safe routes. Only allow during summer time, bad idea for college and high school kids to be drinking during academic year.
- Many.
- This is something Platteville needs. Many other towns rely on a trail system to improve business and tourism. Platteville is a dead end to all ATV Routes in the area.
- Give it a shot.
- I mentioned comments throughout the survey.
- I see this being a very positive thing to bring to Platteville.
- Looking forward to this being allowed in Platteville.
- I am VERY glad the proposed ordinance includes the following: operator's minimum age of 16 years, valid driver's license requirement, seat belt requirement for passengers AND operators, and restrictions on open intoxicants and operating while under the influence. I would NOT be in support of this if any of them were not included.
- Main street is already difficult to navigate especially when coming from a side street like the one-way from the Mound City bank drive-through. Trying to see around parked cars and vehicles going faster than speed limit on Main makes it hard to see regular vehicles, let alone ATVs Madison St has heavy school traffic and should be considered limited to summer only if at all. The first accident involving an ATV that results in injury or death of an ATV occupant will bring liability claims against the city for unsafe routes. I understand attracting tourism, but these are recreation vehicles intended for recreational use, not street use. There has to be a way to allow the ATV community to reach recreational areas without traveling on heavy traffic streets. It is about all people's safety, including ATV users, both local and tourists.
- I do not support the idea of ATV/UTV use in the city. These vehicles are not appropriate in terms of safety for our city and while many would, I do not believe that the users of the vehicles would consistently make good choices. I envision a Friday night with school in session and people ripping off from Second Street drunk and dangerous to themselves and pedestrians. This would diminish the character of our town and make Platteville a less desirable place to live.
- Do they have turn signal? The noise they make, racing on roads, drinking and driving. they are off roads vehicles. Are you taking taxes off people who live on these routes? Do

they carry insurance, are they licensed? Will they be drinking in our parks and ripping up the grass? Will they be fined if there in town after 11:00 pm driving or at the bars?

- the police dep can't or won't do anything about cars and diesel straight pipe trucks on Broadway now.
- I live on West Main and find there is a lot of traffic on that street. We do not need any more traffic of any sort. I very strenuously oppose any ATV/UTV use. They belong on trails, not city streets.
- Does it really matter?
- Who's going to patrol these areas.
- Why is the city so averse to change when it does not directly benefit the university?
- As a resident on one of the proposed routes, we already live with a continuous stream of trucks, semis, motorcycles, cars, quarry trucks, etc. 24 hours a day. The summer that we had construction in front of our house for several months was actually the quietest summer we've ever had in this house, because 7a-8p construction was quieter and more limited than our normal traffic. This is also a route with pedestrians, including school children, runners, and bicyclists. Any increase in traffic affects the safety of all.
- There are no she restrictions on the operation of vehicles within City limits. According to state law children 12 years or older can operate the vehicle. I strongly disagree with allowing young children to operate motor vehicles on city roads with normal traffic.
- Noise, drinking and driving (safety), increased traffic, stress on infrastructure, stress on law enforcement.
- I am against any ATV route through our city. As a college town, we have a very different population than the other areas of Grant County that have implemented these routes. We have heavy pedestrian traffic, limited parking and far more biking, running. I find the route from County B west especially troubling. West Main Street cannot handle ATV traffic without danger to ATV riders, pedestrians and drivers alike.
- This is a horrible idea. These vehicles are loud and unsafe for city streets. This is a regressive proposal. Please do not approve it.
- We should be expanding waking/booking routes, not ATV routes
- Concerned about enforcement of routes and proximity of University to some routes. Doesn't seem like a great idea with the large university population-the age group isn't always the most respectful of property. Also have questions about entry routes into City? I also am not in favor of routes that go primarily through residential neighborhoods.
- what are benefits of doing this? do they outweigh the safety concerns? Is there another city with similar population that has done this? How many accidents? complaints?
- I'm very concerned about the following: a) ATVs are not safe to operate on roads they are off-road vehicles. The Yamaha owner's manual for the Warrior YFM 350XS(C) specifically states that it is "unsafe to operate this vehicle on any public street, road, or highway" - I'm reasonably certain we could look at many more owner's manuals to see

the same statement. They are not designed for use on paved roads. Why are we even considering this when the manufacturers state the safety concerns quite clearly? b) School route safety. There is a lot of potential for interference of ATVs/UTVs with school traffic and hazards to students walking to/from school. If this ultimately is approved, then there should be prohibitions against their use in school zones during start/dismissal times (as has been regulated in other WI cities), as well in areas where we know there are a lot of students crossing roads. c) Noise levels. Platteville has high quality of life due to its being quiet. We live one row of houses from Main Street on the west side of town; unless ATVs/UTVs are quieter than the Amish riding their buggies through town, I frankly don't care to hear them in my neighborhood at night. I could somewhat understand proposed routes to allow people to pass through the town, but I see absolutely no need to encourage recreational driving around town in vehicles that are NOT DESIGNED FOR CITY STREETS. I admit great difficulty in understanding why there is a need for this - we don't allow snowmobiles or horses (except for the Amish) on our city streets. What benefit is there to the larger community? What is the demand underlying this proposal? Why are we disregarding the inherent safety concerns as expressed by the manufacturers themselves?

- I do not want this use to be allowed in the city.
- I think it's a dumb idea!! We have enough vandalism and theft going on now there is no since of adding more!! Plus are there going to be more police add to shifts to patrol the speeding and drinking. It's been witness the drinking and speeding in the country by many!! AND if more officers are needed is it going to reflect on our taxes! If the city wants this then THEY should be responsible for EVERYTHING not us tax payers!!!
- I am very concerned for the safety of pedestrians and motorists. I am extremely concerned for the safety of children walking and riding bikes on our city streets with ATV/UTVs on those same streets.
- Routes do NOT positively affect businesses other than taverns or gas stations. The majority of ATV riders don't use them to gain access to shops or other retail places.
- We have been riding the trails the last 2 years and enjoy it. It brings business to gas stations, restaurants and bars.
- Driving in the dark and not having proper lights to be seen by anyone. They should not be allowed in the dark (there's a reason by bicyclists choose daylight hours). - Driver's under the influence of alcohol or drugs - Pedestrian safety - If anyone can have one, and they are allowed to take the most direct route the designated routes, doesn't that mean that every road can be driven on? - Driver's not following the rules of the road - Does the city get any money from ATV/UTV users for using the roads? Some roads could get extra worn from the tires. Maybe a registration fee should be created. - These are offroad vehicles not created for on-road use -- that makes them dangerous. - The Department of Transportation does not recognize these are roadworthy vehicles: Why should our city? We should choose the possibility of money for some businesses over

the safety of all? - - It needs more input from everyone before this is enacted. - Are there some moving violations that don't go on a user's driver's license? - During the school year, there's too much traffic (car, bike, pedestrian) and that makes this addition to the streets unsafe for everyone.

- There have been concerns raised about other university cities having these. Platteville is unique as it is in a relatively rural community. Allow passage to and through our community will allow people to take advantage of the rural area even more. People from more urban areas may consider coming to Platteville to travel the area, stay in Platteville hotels, eat in Platteville restaurants etc. The draw with these units are not to drive around town, but to drive through or to businesses while also accessing trails in the county. I think this is very positive. I think that the Council should be mindful of over regulating at first and watch for issues that pop up and regulate only when it is apparent that it is needed. A lot of emphasis is put on alcohol consumption and rightly so, these issues can be addressed with regulation from the start and have already been addressed by open intoxicants ordinances in Platteville.
- Don't understand a need for this in Platteville. Routes involve areas highly used by children and families (Smith Park. Aquatic center, and Legion Field) which brings safety concerns. These are off road vehicles by design, what is their purpose in the city? Also concerned about increased traffic noise by elderly residential and nursing facilities, increased work load on police department to monitor appropriate usage and adherence to laws. Especially concerned about community impact when 4000+ college students return in the fall. Are they going to bring ATV's with them, ride them in town, who is going to monitor them? Main street is high traffic and limited parking, limited parking/storage if students bring in trailers will be taking up 4 parking spaces on the streets.
- I think this would be an enforcement nightmare for the police department and the city.
- Just keep the routes away from the existing Arboretum trails and city parks.
- I pray for all of us that folks speak up, I have talked to several folks and they are against this, reweigh even closed one area due to vandalism and we have that already....
- I have very serious concerns over the age of ATV/UTV drivers on any city streets. Legal age to drive an ATV is 12 in Wisconsin, if they are not licensed to drive a regular vehicle, how would they comprehend driving with traffic...especially with the semi traffic along Lancaster St, Chestnut, & Water Streets. Personally, I cannot envision a child under 16 handling traffic. Running around on country property and private property trails are vastly different than being around a semi. What about wheel tax? We pay it on our vehicles, do they have to pay it as well? What about insurance & registration? Are they required to carry the same as regular vehicles? Maybe if these items were addressed, age requirements met, insurance met, etc., I would be in support, but until then, no. I cannot see this being a safe addition to our city.

- Safety concerns. With added college traffic, it's an accident waiting to happen. Hard to see ATV's, especially for semi's. Add to that the starting age for ATV drivers, we'd have 14-year old on the city street, operating motor vehicles. ATV Club is not a non-profit--so why is the city putting in the signs for them at taxpayer cost? For the limited amount of people that will benefit from this, VERY few that are tax- payers for the city, I think it is a not a necessary addition for the city.
- I feel to be inclusive to all, consideration should be given to the ATV users to access our community.
- ATV/UTV use should not be allowed in Platteville. They are a nuisance, they obstruct traffic, they bring very little business to the area except for a couple gallons of gas and a beer or two. They tend to gang up and ignore traffic rules. What's the point? We've got enough horse manure on the streets now.
- I live on a route (county B) we see recreational vehicles regularly and have no problem with them. Like anything else you need to accept that there will be problems but willingness to embrace other people's ideas and working through the issues will create a more diversified inclusionary community. ATV riding may not be for everyone but for the ones who afford and choose to do so it would be nice if our local communities would accept our choices in recreation.
- Platteville PD rarely stops loud trucks and motorcycles screaming through neighborhoods especially on north 2nd St. This is going to make our neighborhoods even louder.
- Other municipalities are opening roadways all over the place and are making lots on tourist dollars. IT would be a shame if the largest community in Grant county didn't get on board and open its streets to ATV/UTV's. I think people need to educate themselves or not have a say. Get educated before you just vote against this.
- Noise, filth, obnoxious behavior, crowding, parking and traffic issues. All around bad for the city.
- THANK YOU for the broad dissemination of information on this!
- I live on Water Street, one of the proposed routes. My house went unsold for one year mainly because of the volume of noise from the high truck and auto traffic on Water Street, a state highway. This will increase the noise and the traffic. Installing a lane just for ATV/UTV would reduce the space available and necessary for safe passage of large trucks and farm equipment. I assume this would also involve "No Parking" signs will be added on the proposed lane, a big inconvenience for residents along Water Street. How will the ATV/UTV drivers access the trail from outside the city limits? Do they break the law and travel on an unmarked roadway into the city? Who will enforce this boundary? It's my understanding drivers as young as 12 years old could be operating these vehicles. This is unsafe and dangerous. Are the operators required to carry insurance and register their vehicles? This will create and additional enforcement burden on our police dept.
- I support this because of the community we live in and the proposed rules seem fair.

- No, should not pass.
- I am concerned with how this will impact the safety of roads. While I understand that if
 they operate on city roads they are held to the laws governing those but what happens
 if an officer notices a violation and then the ATV is on the private trail? Can an officer
 still give a citation with the same consequence? Or will we now have ATVs racing to a
 trail to avoid consequences? Will they ATVs be registered with license plates so you can
 track them down if they flee? I understand the appeal of this for businesses to make
 money but as a mother and frequent pedestrian I worry about how this will impact our
 community. I was once asked what I would like to see Platteville be...a safe community
 that is family friendly. I do not see ATV routes through town as either. We need to be
 focusing on attracting families to our community and I strongly believe this will
 negatively impact our ability to do that which will then have long term consequences for
 our community, especially businesses.
- I feel every street should be open.
- ATV/UTV are off road vehicles. They are too loud and too dangerous for city streets. They're not even licensed to drive on city streets. Next people will be wanting snowmobiles going through town. You are also purposing this next to an elementary school. I worry enough about my children on Broadway. Safety is always number 1 and this is not safe! I do not support this at all!
- No.
- Why are we purposing are routes when we don't have bicycle routes/bike lanes? Bicycles are quiet and don't pollute and don't take up parking spaces especially downtown. We should encourage people to bike.
- ATV/UTV usage in Wisconsin has been growing over the past 10+ years and the City of Platteville needs to decide if they are going to embrace or shun them. Other communities have embraced them (Darlington, Monroe, Black River Falls, etc.) and the impact on their community has been positive. ATV/UTV's are not inexpensive to purchase and operate.... therefore, the stereotype of the typical rider should be compared to current "Harley-Davidson" riders. They are not "hell raisers" but instead are people of all social classes that just enjoy being outdoors.
- I am concerned for the neighborhood children as well as the many walkers who enjoy our community. Additionally, I question the regulation of noise limits, although mentioned in the code regulation unless officers will be equipped with decimeters I find this an aspect that will be difficult to enforce. I support change for the betterment but do not see this as one of those opportunities, as such I am opposed to ATV/UTV within Platteville city limits.
- It would be nice to have the trails through the city so the Potosi trails would connect to the Belmont trails.

- If any streets are opened to ATV/UTV use ALL city streets and trails should be opened to ATV/UTV use, this includes the Rountree Branch trail so users can access Keystone Parkway.
- I think the City Council should be embarrassed by how they treated the gentleman that spoke on behalf of the ATV club at the meeting on May 22nd. - I feel that the arguments opposed to these routes are based largely on fearmongering to the public. "If you approve this plan, then ATV gangs of 10 people will drive past the pool and ruin your family outing" is not a valid point. Nearly all surrounding townships and cities have established similar routes, and many states have approved these ideas long before ours was considered. This proposal brings a hopeful impact to businesses in the area and makes our city more visitor and citizen friendly. If noise is the main concern against these ATVs/UTVs, please consider new ordinances to ban all motorcycles.
- I am a farm kid and grew up with ATVs as well as trail ride. They are engineered for earth terrain and not asphalt or cement. They don't handle the same and can be squarely. I assure you that someone will get injured riding busy streets.
- This is not good for the people who live in town. Who is this plan aimed at? Who is to benefit and at whose expense?
- I like the approach to getting the community's opinion.

- Please pass an ordinance that would give riders the same freedoms as all vehicles, but as I said earlier, any passage that begins to open access will help. As with all things, there are always going to be problems, but please don't penalize law abiding citizens for the actions of a few bad seeds.
- No.
- I do not want them zipping by streets that have parks or the pool. Asking for trouble.

- Already enough traffic concerns in the city of Platteville no benefit to add more problems to the mix.
- This is a growing recreational activity in WI, with significant increases seen in SW WI. Providing thoroughfares through the city will help increase visitors to our community and is an additional form of tourism. Including our community in supporting of this activity should help those businesses along the routes. It may also foster the establishment of businesses supporting this recreational activity outside the city. (e.g. RV parks, additional off-road trails, sales and service facilities, and others catering to UTV/ATV activities).
- As with all vehicle traffic in the City, enforcement is key. My personal experience has been the self-enforcement of this group of enthusiasts. They realize access is a privilege, not a right, and as such will help to self-regulate.
- I have no concerns with the current proposal.
- I am not in favor of opening up city streets to ATV/UTV for the following reasons: 1) The Specialty Vehicle Institute of America, a manufacturers trade group, takes the position that "ATVs are designed, manufactured and sold for off-road use only." 2) Nearly 100,000 people are hurt annually in ATV crashes, according to federal figures. Researchers have found that roadway injuries tend to be more serious than those on forest trails and other off-road locations. 3) WI state law requires ATV drivers to be at least 12 years old and UTV drivers to be at least 16 — and then only after receiving safety certification. I don't believe that 12-year-old children have the capacity to make quick decisions to avoid an accident and we should not put them in a situation where they need to make a decision to either avoid a pedestrian, child crossing the street, bicyclist or a car they didn't see coming. 4) No surface is more dangerous for ATVs than pavement, many road safety authorities say. But across the country, more local and state governments are allowing all-terrain vehicles to be driven on paved roads. 5) The ATV industry opposes driving off-road vehicles on public roadways, cautioning that paved surfaces hamper the machines' handling ability and can cause operators to lose control and crash. Several ATV manufacturers include warnings in their manuals about collisions with other vehicles on public roads. Honda goes so far as to advise riders approaching a paved road to "get off and walk your ATV across." 6) From 2003 to 2013, 13 children have been killed while riding ATVs on public roads in Minnesota. In 150 accidents reviewed by the Star Tribune, 40 percent of the riders were younger than 16 and driving on public roads. In most cases, the children were on ATVs designed for adults — a common practice that has been connected to almost 1,200 U.S. deaths over the past decade. A child riding down a road on an adult-sized ATV embodies the industry's biggest safety concerns, said Tim Buche, president of the Specialty Vehicle Institute of America, an ATV trade group. "If we could change two things, it would be youth on adult machines and ATVs on roads." 7) The problem, road safety officials say, is that car and truck drivers can have a hard time seeing ATVs, which usually don't have

turn signals or rearview mirrors. "Traffic isn't used to ATVs," said Dietrich Flesch, Wabasha County's chief road superintendent who opposed opening the county's road to ATVs. And the machines won't fare well in accidents, he said. "I don't believe they meet any crash standards a car would meet." 8) Many of these streets, Broadway especially, are school children's routes to and from school as they walk or bike to Neal Wilkins to catch shuttle busses to and from other schools in the city. I would be very nervous for students walking home after school, especially as the weather changes and it is darker in the afternoons, even though the ordinance calls for a restriction from December – March. Many times, we have snow in October and this will only increase the probability of accidents with ice and snow. 9) The purpose of town government is to protect public health, safety and welfare of the citizens that call Platteville home. I respectfully ask that this proposal be denied protecting the public health, safety and welfare of all city residents, ATV/UTV riders included.

I think it's ridiculous that we are spending my taxpayer money to send out letters to people on the route to make sure it's ok. No one asked if a crotch rocket can drive past my house at 30 mph, but they do, and they are way louder than an ATV or UTV.
- This would be a very very positive business opportunity to increase exposure and bring business to this city!!!!
- No.
- Don't listen to the few whiners and complainers. This is great for the city.
- I think it would be a great asset to connect the community with the current county and trail system.
- Given the fact that Grant County and other cities in Southwest Wisconsin have approved ATV/UTV use with no real problems, the city's caution is excessive. It's as if the city doesn't want the business of ATV/UTV riders, which is grossly shortsighted.
- Thank you for the city off Platteville for looking into opening UTV routes it will connect other routes already in place.
- No.
- None.
- I think it would be awesome if we could drive ATVs around town because I don't have a license to drive a car but I have an ATV license so then I'd be able to drive myself around and not have to rely on others.
- I am concerned about the UW-P population and routes going past our schools. Maybe having a season only when yep is not in session. I am also concerned about the slippery slope of opening more routes or individuals getting from their homes to the route eventually. I am also concerned about the image of freely drinking and atving especially in the city. What can we do to make sure that doesn't occur?
- I feel allowing UTV\ATV traffic in the city is an excellent opportunity that will lead to increased tourism dollars to the community, county and surrounding area. I own a UTV and live in Smelser township south of Platteville but I keep and mainly ride my UTV in Lafayette county due to the limited UTV routes in my area.

- This is a great idea.
- It would be nice to be able to get to Walmart, McDonald's, burger king and Platteville gas
- As a parent of young kids, I still support the routes because the routes are on roads that are highly traveled and I am aware of the dangers for my kids already on these roads.

All-Terrain Vehicle and Utility Terrain Vehicle Ordinance Study

Thirteen cities in Wisconsin of similar size to the City of Platteville were selected for the purposes of this research study. Their ordinances were examined for laws regarding the usage of *All Terrain Vehicles* and *Utility Terrain Vehicles*. What follows is a list of the cities examined:

Of the thirteen cities, only seven had ordinances that addressed ATV/UTV use. Those cities were Richland Center, Merrill, Menomonie, Portage, Tomah, Reedsburg and Ashland. Copies of their ordinances are attached to this document.

The police departments of those respective cities, including Superior, were contacted and the following series of questions were asked:

- 1. Do you have designated ATV Routes on city streets? If yes, for how long?
- 2. Has this been a favorable thing or unfavorable for the community and businesses?
- 3. Any lessons learned?
- 4. Have you experienced any enforcement issues?

The responses to those questions and a summary of their corresponding ordinances are further contained in this document between pages 2 and 4.

Richland Center, WI – Chief Lucas Clements

ATV/UTV use is not permitted on any public property except those areas specifically designated as ATV/UTV routes. There is an exception granted to city residents that allows them to operate an ATV or UTV owned by them on city streets on a direct route between their residence and the nearest point on a designated city ATV/UTV route. This exception was enacted because residents who did not live directly on the ATV/UTV route would have to load their vehicle onto a trailer, drive to the route and unload the vehicle to utilize the ATV route. This would have been an unreasonable inconvenience to city residents who wished to access the ATV/UTV route.

ATV/UTV use is further regulated by ordinances that prohibited operation from sundown to sunrise. All operators must have a valid driver's license, insurance, registration and the ATV/UTV must meet Wisconsin State noise pollution standards.

Chief Clements advised that the routes had been in effect for approximately one month. In the planning phase, there were concerns about noise from ATVs. For that reason, the routes generally follow truck routes through the city which are established partially for the purpose of noise control. During the first month there have been no accidents involving ATVs or UTVs. The department has received a few complaints regarding speed but the Chief acknowledged that they receive the same complaints regarding regular motor vehicle use as well and that speeding is not an issue relegated to ATVs and UTVs. He advised that during the first week, there were complaints made to the police department about the presence of ATVs and UTVs on city streets. He advised that those complaints were unfounded and based on unfamiliarity with the new ordinance. The complaints were reduced by public education on the new ordinance.

Chief Clements recommended the implementation of a "local access" ordinance. He advised that the department sent one officer to an ATV/UTV law enforcement training course in Iowa County and they received a TraCS update to address traffic laws related to ATV/UTV use.

Merrill, WI - Chief Corey Bennett

Merrill has had ATV/UTV routes through the city for approximately 2 years. According to Chief Bennett, the city tried to keep their ordinances as close to State Statute as possible because they found that it addressed almost all of the general concerns of the public.

Merrill has an ordinance that permits an ATV/UTV operator to drive between their residence or lodging to the nearest point of the ATV/UTV route. They limit the speed of ATV's and UTVS within the city to a maximum of 15 mph. Chief Bennett advised that they have not had any noise complaints and he suggested that it could be a result of the speed limit. One by product of the speed limit is complaints that the 15 mph speed limit inhibits normal traffic flow and could cause safety issues. They are currently considering changes to the current speed limit.

The only law enforcement issues that they have faced have been issues of speeding and nonregistration. In the beginning there were general complaints about the routes but those quickly died down after community education took place and their use became commonplace.

Chief Bennett advised that sticking closely with the state statutes in chapter 23 seemed to work well.

City of Menomonie, WI – Patrol Sgt. Matthew Benrud

Menomonie adopts Wisconsin State Statute 23.33 which controls ATV/UTV routes and their operation thereon. In addition to adopting State Statutes, the city further regulates the use of ATV's to between dawn and dusk and only between April 1st and December 1st.

The City of Menomonie only has three streets that are designated ATV routes. According to Sgt. Benrud, there have been no issues related to the operation of ATV's along those routes or noise complaints. They have had those routes for two years.

Sgt. Benrud suggested that keeping the rules simple makes it easier for the citizens to follow and for the police to enforce.

Portage, WI – Sergeant Brian Fehd

ATV/UTV use is restricted by ordinance. It is against city ordinance to operate any motor vehicle manufactured for off road use on any city streets, alleys, parks, sidewalks, bikeways, parking lots or on any public lands or private land open to the public. Any operator of an off-road vehicle on private property must have written consent of the property owner before any operation on private property.

Furthermore, snowmobile trails are restricted to snowmobile use only.

The City of Portage does not have any designated ATV/UTV routes, only snowmobile trails. The only legal private use of an ATV/UTV within city limits is for snow maintenance of sidewalks and driveways.

Tomah, WI – Chief Mark Nicholson

The City of Tomah generally prohibits ATV/UTV use within the city limits except for snow plowing sidewalks and driveways. There are no ATV routes through town, however, the city does have temporary routes that are only in effect during the Monroe County Fair and the Grant National Tractor Pull. The City is in the process of potentially establishing permanent ATV/UTV routes.

The use of ATVs and UTVs is limited to plowing snow from sidewalks during the winter.

Superior, WI – Lt. Thor Trone

I spoke with Superior PD Lt. Thor Trone regarding ATV/UTV use in their city. He told me that they are currently researching and in the process of proposing an ordinance for ATV/UTV use in Superior. He advised that they have temporary trails for ATVs and Snowmobiles and that they enforce their use through the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) code. He advised that they have a special event that causes issues because it draws lots of ATV/UTV drivers. In the news, it looks like Superior designated several ATV/UTV routes through the city but they still do not have any ordinances in effect that manage the use of those routes.

Lt. Trone shared the training materials that their department received from the DNR.

Reedsburg, WI – Lt. Patrick Cummings

Reedsburg, WI has had ATV/UTV routes since 2016. Their City Ordinances adopt Wisconsin State Statute 23.33 but that is it. I spoke with Lt. Patrick Cummings on the phone and he told me that they have had absolutely no issues since they opened up the routes. He said that they expected some problems but they were pleasantly surprised to find that it has been smooth sailing. There have been no accidents involving ATVs or UTVs and no law enforcement issues that he could recall. The towns reception has been positive, especially the businesses.

In the advice category, he recommended that all the stakeholders be part of the planning committee and that an emphasis be placed on public education and officer education if the ordinance is enacted. He said that, in retrospect, extra effort spent educating the public through Facebook and the newspaper probably would have preempted a lot of phone calls to their dispatch center.

Ashland, WI

Ashland adopted Wisconsin State Statute 23.33 and added several extra regulations of their own. Most notably the speed limit was fixed at 10mph, ATV/UTV exhaust must be stock from the factory, hours of operation are limited to 6:00am to 10:00pm Sunday-Thursday and extended to midnight on Friday and Saturday night.

Attempts to speak with a member of the command staff or a supervisor were unsuccessful.

<u>RICHLAND CENTER - ORDINANCE EXCERPTS</u>

ORDINANCE NO. 2018-1

AN ORDINANCE CREATING CHAPTER 104 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF ATV/UTV ROUTES IN THE CITY AND REGULATING THE USE OF ATVS AND UTVS IN THE CITY

The Common Council of the City of Richland Center, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1:

Chapter 104 of the Code of Ordinances providing for the establishment of ATV/UTV routes in the City is adopted to read as follows:

CHAPTER 104

OPERATION OF ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES AND UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLES WITHIN THE CITY

104.01 Purpose. The purpose of this chapter is to establish an all-terrain vehicle ("ATV") and utility terrain vehicle ("UTV") route within the City of Richland Center and to provide regulation of the use of all-terrain vehicles and utility terrain vehicles within the City.

104.02 Definitions.

 All definitions set forth in sec. 23.33 (1) Wisconsin Statutes are hereby adopted by reference and shall be applicable to this Chapter.

(2) In addition, within this chapter "ATV" shall mean all-terrain vehicle and "UTV" shall mean utility terrain vehicle

104.03 Applicability. The provisions of this chapter shall apply to all areas within the corporate limits of the City of Richland Center.

104.04 General Prohibition Against Use of ATVs/UTVs on Public Property Off of Designated ATV/UTV routes; Exception for Route Access by City Residents.

(1) General Prohibition. No person shall operate an ATV or UTV upon any public property within the City of Richland Center including but not limited to City streets, sidewalks, walkways, trails, parks, cemeteries or other city-owned property except upon those areas specifically designated as an ATV/UTV route by section 104.05 of this chapter or as otherwise permitted by the City Council.

(2) Exception for City Residents. Residents of the City may operate an ATV or UTV owned by them on City streets on a direct route between their place of residence and the nearest point on a designated City ATV/UTV route for the sole purpose of accessing the ATV/UTV routes in the City.

104.05 Designation of ATV and UTV Routes. The following portions of city streets shall constitute designated ATV and UTV routes:

Seminary Street between the west City incorporation limit and South Church Street;

South Church Street between Seminary Street and US Highway 14;

US Highway 14 between South Church Street and Bohmann Drive;

Bohmann Drive between US Highway14 and the south City incorporation limit;

Orange Street between West Seminary Street and Seventh Street;

Seventh Street between Orange Street and Jefferson Street;

Jefferson Street between Seventh Street and Eighth Street;

Eighth Street between Jefferson Street and Park Street;

Park Street between Eighth Street and Tenth Street;

Tenth Street between Park Street and Cedar Street;

Cedar Street between Tenth Street and the North City incorporation limit.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the use of the portion of the ATV/UTV route on US Highway 14 shall not be permitted until and unless the Wis. Dept. of Transportation approves the use of that portion of the route by ATVs/UTVs.

104.06 Limitations on Usage on Designated ATV/UTV Routes. The following limitations apply to the operation of ATVs/UTVs upon those areas specifically designated as an ATV/UTV route by this chapter:

(1) Speed. No ATV/UTV shall be operated at a speed greater than 25 miles per hour on those areas within the City specifically designated as an ATV/UTV route by this chapter except where the posted limit is greater than 25 mph the maximum permitted speed shall be 35 mph.

(2) Lights. No ATV/UTV may be operated on any designated ATV/UTV route without fully functional headlights, tail-lights, and brake lights.

(3) Operation on Roadway Only. All ATVs and UTVs shall operate only on the paved

roadway on a designated ATV/UTV route. Operation on sidewalks, paved shoulders intended and posted for use by bicycles or pedestrians, gravel shoulders, grassy in-slope, ditches or other areas of a city street right-of-way other than upon the paved roadway on a designated ATV/UTV route is prohibited.

(4) Hours of Operation. No ATV/UTV may be operated on any designated ATV/UTV route within the City from sundown to the following dawn except pursuant to special permission granted by the Public Safety Committee of the City Council.

(5) Age, License and Protective Headgear. On any designated ATV/UTV route all operators must be sixteen (16) years of age or older and have a valid driver's license. No person under the age of eighteen (18) years may operate an ATV/UTV on any designated route unless wearing approved protective headgear of the type required under s. 347.485 (1) (a) and with the chin strap properly fastened.

(6) Noise. No ATV/UTV may be operated on any designated ATV/UTV route which does not meet all applicable Wisconsin State noise pollution standards.

(7) Insurance. The operator of any ATV/UTV operating on any designated ATV/UTV route shall carry or have readily available proof of liability insurance coverage for the ATV/UTV being operated.

(8) Registration. All ATV/UTVs being operated on any ATV/UTV route within the City shall be currently registered in conformity with the registration requirements of the State of Wisconsin and shall display the evidence of registration required by statute.

104.07 ATV/UTV ROUTE SIGNS.

(1) Route Signs. Every area authorized as an all-terrain vehicle/utility-terrain vehicle route shall be designated by state approved standard all-terrain vehicle/utility-terrain vehicle route signs having a reflectorized white all-terrain vehicle symbol, bordered and message on a reflectorized green background with a minimum size of 24 inches by 18 inches with directional arrow, where appropriate, placed at the beginning of an ATV/UTV route and at such locations and intervals as necessary to enable the ATV/UTV operators to follow the route.

(2) Signage. Provisions of this chapter permitting operation of ATVs/UTVs on ATV/UTV routes within the City shall not be operative until proper signage has been placed as directed by the City Council.

104.08 TEMPORARY SUSPENSION OF USE OF ATV/UTV ROUTES AND DESIGNATION OF DETOURS.

The Richland Center Public Works Superintendent shall have the authority to temporarily

suspend ATV/UTV operation on any portion of a designated ATV/UTV route for up to ninety (90) days due to hazard, construction or emergency conditions in any public street designated as part of an ATV/UTV route and, in concert with the chief of police, to designate detours. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the City Council may overrule the location of any detour or set alternative detour routes.

104.09 INCORPORATION OF WISCONSIN STATUTES.

(1) All provisions of section 23.33 Wisconsin Statutes as the same may from time to time be amended are hereby incorporated by reference and shall be applicable to ATV/UTV operation within the City.

(2) All provisions of chapters 340 through 347 Wisconsin Statutes defining terms and relating to the use of ATVs/UTVs as the same may from time to time be amended are hereby incorporated by reference and shall be applicable to ATV/UTV operation within the City.

104.10 PENALTIES.

(1) Penalties for violations of the Wisconsin Statutes shall be as set forth in sec. 23.33(13) Wis. Stats. or in chapters 340 through 347 Wis. Stats. Deposit amounts for such violations shall be as set forth in the current Revised Uniform State Traffic Deposit Schedule.

(2) The penalty for any violation of this chapter not addressed in sec. 23.33(13) or chapters 340 through 347 Wis. Stats. or elsewhere in the Wisconsin Statutes shall be a forfeiture of \$50.00 together with all applicable costs, surcharges and assessments.

SECTION 2 EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall become effective upon its passage and publication as required by law.

MERRILL - ORDINANCE EXCERPTS

• ARTICLE V. - ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES AND UTILITY-TERRAIN VEHICLE OPERATION^[4]

• Sec. 36-249. - State all-terrain vehicle and utility-terrain vehicle laws adopted.

Except as otherwise specifically provided in this article, the statutory provisions describing and defining regulations with respect to all-terrain vehicles and utility-terrain vehicles in the following enumerated sections of the state statutes, exclusive of any provisions herein relating to penalties to be imposed and exclusive of any regulations for which the statutory penalty is a forfeiture or term of imprisonment are adopted and by reference made a part of this Code, are hereby adopted by reference and incorporated herein as if fully set forth. Acts required to be performed or prohibited by such statutes are required or prohibited by this article. Any future amendments, revisions or modifications of the statutes incorporated herein by reference are intended to be made part of this Code. The list of statutes includes, but is not limited to, the following: Wis. Stats., Chapter 23.33.

(Ord. No. 2015-05, § 1, 3-10-2015)

• Sec. 36-250. - Applicability of traffic regulations to all-terrain vehicle and utility-terrain

vehicle operation.

No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle upon any street, highway or alley within the city in violation of the traffic regulation provisions of Wis. Stats. §§ 346.02(10) and (11), 346.04, 346.06, 346.11, 346.14(1), 346.18—346.21, 346.26, 346.27, 346.33, 346.35, 346.37, 346.39, 346.40, 346.44, 346.46—346.48, 346.50(1)(b), 346.51—346.55, 346.87—346.91, 346.92(1) and 346.94(1), and (9).

(Ord. No. 2015-05, § 1, 3-10-2015)

• Sec. 36-251. - [Intent.]

The intent of this article is to provide a means for persons to travel from a residence and/or lodging establishment within the limits of the City of Merrill for the shortest distance necessary for a person to operate an all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle to the all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle route or trail that is closest to that residence or lodging establishment.

- (a) Such travel shall be allowed only when the connecting Lincoln County all-terrain vehicle and utility-terrain vehicle trails are open and operational.
- (b) Routes may be closed at any time, by order of the chief of police.
- (c) The city shall, from time to time, designate a route within the city limits, maps of which shall be kept on file with the office of the city clerk and the Merrill Police Department. That map delineates allowed routes of travel for all-terrain vehicles or utility-terrain vehicles.

(Ord. No. 2015-05, § 1, 3-10-2015)

• Sec. 36-252. - Conditions for operation.

- (a) Speed. No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle within city limits at a speed in excess of 15 miles per hour.
- (b) Place of travel. Shall operate on the far right portion of the highway or shoulder and shall not in the roadway/traffic lane, and travel with the flow of traffic.
- (c) Single-file operation. All-terrain vehicles and utility-terrain vehicles shall be operated in single file and as far to the right portion of the street as possible.
- (d) Headlights and tail lamps shall be on at all times during operations.
- (e) All-terrain vehicle and utility-terrain vehicle operators shall yield the right-of-way to other vehicular traffic and pedestrians.
- (f) Sidewalk operation prohibited. No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle on any sidewalk or pedestrian way within the city.
- (g) Street crossings. No operator of an all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle shall cross any street, except at its intersection and then only at right angles to the street crossed.
- (h) Use of trailers or sleds. No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle upon any street within the city with any person, trailer or sled attached or trailing said vehicle, unless it is designed for such activities. Anyone operating such conveyance in an unsafe or reckless manner shall be deemed in violation of this section.
- (i) Operation in parks. No person shall drive an all-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle in any park within the city.
- (j) Permission of property owner required. No person shall operate an all-terrain vehicle or utilityterrain vehicle on any private property not owned or controlled by him within the city without the express consent or permission of the owner.
- (k) All-terrain vehicle or utility-terrain vehicle crossing a bridge shall:
 - (1) Cross the bridge in the most direct manner practicable and at a place where no obstruction prevents a quick and safe crossing.
 - (2) Stay as far to the right of the roadway or shoulder as practicable.
 - (3) Stop the vehicle prior to crossing.
 - (4) Yield the right-of-way to other vehicles, pedestrians, and electric personal assistive mobility devices using the roadway or shoulder.
 - (5) Exit the highway as quickly and safely as practicable after crossing the bridge.

All-terrain vehicles or utility-terrain vehicles violating any of the above conditions would be subject to the underlying violation of operating on the roadway.

(Ord. No. 2015-05, § 1, 3-10-2015)

<u>CITY OF MENOMONIE - ORDINANCE EXCERPTS</u>

6-1-12: ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE USAGE:

- A. Intent And Purpose: The intent and purpose of this section is to establish all-terrain vehicle routes in the city and to regulate the operation of all-terrain vehicles thereon.
- B. Operation Of All-Terrain Vehicles: Pursuant to section 23.33(4)(d)4, Wisconsin statutes, except as otherwise provided in section 23.33(4), Wisconsin statutes, no person may operate an all-terrain vehicle on the roadway portion of any street in the city except on streets that are designated as all-terrain vehicle routes by this section. Operation of all-terrain vehicles on a street in the city that is an all-terrain vehicle route is authorized only for the extreme right side of the roadway except that left turns may be made from any part of the roadway that is safe given prevailing conditions. On paved roadways, all-terrain vehicles must be operated on the paved portion of the roadway and not on the gravel shoulder.
- C. Designation Of All-Terrain Vehicle Routes: The following portions of streets only are designated as all-terrain vehicle routes in the city:

Midway Road from westerly city limits (intersection of 410th Street and 550th Avenue) to four hundred feet (400') easterly;

410th Street (also known as Midway Road) from 550th Avenue northerly to State Highway 29; and

440th Street (also known as Bongey Drive) from 461st Avenue northerly to 2909 Bongey Drive (also known as the Great Escape Bar And Grill).

- D. Rules And Regulations: Pursuant to section 23.33(8), Wisconsin statutes, the following restrictions are placed on the use of the all-terrain vehicle routes designated by this section:
- 1. Routes shall be marked with uniform all-terrain vehicle route signs in accordance with section NR 64.12(7), Wisconsin administrative code. No person may do any of the following in regard to signs marking all-terrain vehicle routes:
- a. Intentionally remove, damage, deface, move, or obstruct any uniform all-terrain vehicle route sign or standard or intentionally interfere with the effective operation of a uniform all-terrain vehicle route sign or standard if the sign or standard is legally placed by the state, any municipality or any authorized individual.
- b. Possess any uniform all-terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard of the types established by the Wisconsin department of transportation for the warning, instruction or information of the public, unless he or she obtained the uniform all-terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard in a lawful manner. Possession of a uniform all-terrain vehicle route or trail sign or standard creates a rebuttable presumption of illegal possession.
- 2. Operation of an all-terrain vehicle shall be subject to all provisions of section 23.33, Wisconsin statutes, which is adopted as a part of this section by reference, pursuant to section 23.33(11), Wisconsin statutes.
- 3. In addition to the provisions of section 23.33, Wisconsin statutes, the following restrictions are placed on the use of the all-terrain vehicle routes designated by this section:
- a. All designated all-terrain vehicle routes are posted for thirty five (35) miles per hour. Operators shall reduce speed whenever the posted limit is less or as stated in the Wisconsin statutes that relate to all-terrain vehicle operation.

- b. All all-terrain vehicle operators shall ride single file.
- c. The allowed hours of operation shall be from dawn until dusk.
- d. Anyone under the age of twelve (12) cannot operate an all-terrain vehicle on an all-terrain vehicle route under any circumstances.
- e. Anyone born after January 1, 1988, cannot operate an all-terrain vehicle on an all-terrain vehicle route without a safety certification.
- f. All all-terrain vehicle operators under the age of eighteen (18) must wear a helmet.
- g. Lighted headlamps and taillamps shall be displayed at all times.
- h. All-terrain vehicle operation shall be permitted from April 1 to December 1 only.
 - E. Additional Provisions: All signs, posts and similar material associated with the approved all-terrain vehicle routes in the city will be installed and maintained by the city although the cost of materials, installation and maintenance shall be borne by an ATV club or organization through an agreement with the city. The agreement will be reviewed annually by the common council to ensure compliance with all provisions of this section.
 - F. Penalty: Any person who shall violate any provision of this section shall, upon conviction, be subject to the penalties set forth at section 23.33(13), Wisconsin statutes, provided, however, for violations of this section that are not set forth in the state statutes, the forfeiture for said violation shall not exceed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) together with the costs of prosecution. (Ord. 2016-12, 8-1-2016)

• ARTICLE IX. - ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES AND OFF-ROAD MOTOR VEHICLE OPERATION^[6]

• Sec. 50-281. - State all-terrain vehicle laws adopted.

The provisions describing and defining regulations with respect to all-terrain vehicles in the following enumerated subsections of Wis. Stats. § 23.33, and any future amendments or revisions, are hereby adopted by reference and made part of this section as if fully set forth herein.

(Code 1990, § 10-4-1)

• Sec. 50-282. - Penalties.

Violation of this article shall be punishable by a forfeiture and enforced pursuant to law.

(Code 1990, § 10-4-2)

• Sec. 50-283. - Unauthorized operation of motor vehicles on public or private property.

- (a) *Purpose*.
 - (1) The unauthorized off-road operation of motor vehicles has resulted in serious damage to public and private lands including damage or destruction of vegetation, animal life and improvement to the lands;
 - (2) The unauthorized off-road operation of motor vehicles has resulted in the permanent scarring of land and an increase in both erosion and air pollution;
 - (3) The unauthorized off-road operation of motor vehicles has resulted in collisions and near collisions threatening the life and safety of the operators of such vehicles as well as of other persons; and
 - (4) The unauthorized off-road operation of motor vehicles has resulted in a loss of the privacy, quietude and serenity to which the owners and users of land are rightfully entitled.
- (b) *Definitions*. For purposes of this section, the terms below shall be defined as follows:
 - (1) *Unauthorized* means without the express prior consent of the owner, lessee, manager or other person authorized to give consent by the owner or lessee of land. Authorization shall not be implied from a failure to post private or public land.
 - (2) *Off-road* means any location which:
 - a. Is not a paved or maintained public street or alley;
 - b. Is not used or maintained by the owner or lessee of land as a driveway, parking lot or other way for motor vehicles; or
 - c. Is a private trail for use only by the owner or his permittees for recreational or other vehicular use. Off-road shall not include any creekbed, riverbed or lake provided, however, that this subsection shall not apply to snowmobiles or other vehicles being operated on the ice covering such creekbed, riverbed or lake.

- (3) *Motor vehicle* means, for purposes of this section, any vehicle which is self-propelled and shall include but not be limited to automobiles, trucks, jeeps, vans, motorcycles, motorbikes, go-karts, motorized three-wheeled vehicles, all-terrain vehicles, mopeds, snowmobiles, dune buggies, golf carts and tractors. Motor vehicle shall not mean any airplane, railroad train, boat, wheelchair or bicycle. A vehicle which would otherwise be defined as a motor vehicle under this section shall not be so defined while:
 - a. It is being operated solely for the purpose of construction or maintenance of an improvement to land or solely for access to construction or maintenance sites provided such operation is by persons having legitimate business on such lands or sites;
 - b. It is being operated by or at the direction of public employees or utility company employees as part of their employment duties.
 - c. It is being operated by the holder of an easement or right of access on or over the land on which operation is occurring or the holder's employees or agents.
- (c) Unauthorized off-road operation.
 - (1) The unauthorized off-road operation of a motor vehicle is prohibited.
 - (2) Except for authorized maintenance vehicles and snowmobiles or all-terrain vehicles operating in authorized areas pursuant to this section, it shall be unlawful to operate any minibike, go-kart, all-terrain vehicle or any other motor-driven craft or vehicle principally manufactured for off-highway use on the city streets, alleys, parks, sidewalks, bikeways, parking lots or on any public lands or private lands or parking lots held open to the public. The operator shall at all times have the written consent of the owner, properly dated as to the year, before operation of such craft or vehicle on private lands.
- (d) *Prohibited use of snowmobile trails.* Except as provided in subsection (b)(3) of this section, no person shall operate any motor vehicle other than a snowmobile on a snowmobile trail.

(Code 1990, § 10-4-3)

TOMAH - ORDINANCE EXCERPTS

• ARTICLE VIII. - ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES

• Sec. 44-177. - Purpose.

The purpose of this article is to designate restricted all-terrain vehicle routes to aid law enforcement in parking control during the Grand National Tractor Pull and Monroe County Fair.

(Code 1993, § 7.24)

• Sec. 44-178. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

All-terrain vehicle means an engine-driven device which has a net weight of 650 pounds or less, which has a width of 48 inches or less, which is equipped with a seat designed to be straddled by the operator and which is designed to travel on three or more tires.

Special events means the Grand National Tractor Pull or Monroe County Fair.

(Code 1993, § 7.24)

• Sec. 44-179. - Routes.

The following portions of streets are designated as all-terrain vehicle routes, effective only during special events commencing at 7:30 a.m. on the Wednesday immediately preceding the special events until the following Sunday at 11:00 p.m.:

Butts Ave. from Fair St. to the north entrance of the Tomah High School parking lot;

Fair St. from Butts Ave. to the east entrance of the parking area on Fair St.; and

Grassman St. from Butts Ave. to Kristi Ln.

(Code 1993, § 7.24)

• Sec. 44-180. - Restrictions.

Except as provided below regarding snow removal, the use of the all-terrain routes shall be limited to one all-terrain vehicle operated by a designated individual of the Monroe County Agriculture Society. Said all-terrain vehicle shall be required to display a yellow flashing light that can be observed from all directions around it and a sign that clearly designates the all-terrain vehicle as a parking control vehicle. The all-terrain vehicle used on the route and its designated operators shall conform with any and all equipment, registration or operating regulations of the state statutes.

(Code 1993, § 7.24)

• Sec. 44-181. - Snow removal.

All-terrain vehicles may be used within the city for the purpose of snow removal from driveways and sidewalks provided the following conditions are met:

- (1) The all-terrain vehicle must be properly registered with the state department of natural resources pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 23.33(2).
- (2) The driver of the all-terrain vehicle must possess a valid driver's license.
- (3) All lights on the all-terrain vehicle must be in working order.
- (4) On an annual basis, the all-terrain vehicle must be pre-registered with the city police department on forms provided by the city. Proof of insurance shall be submitted at the time of registration.
- (5) All-terrain vehicles must not cross federal or state highways except on a trailer.
- (6) A "slow moving vehicle" sign must be mounted on the back of the all-terrain vehicle.
- (7) The operator must comply with all applicable rules of operation set forth in Wis. Stats. § 23.33.

(Code 1993, § 7.24)

REEDSBURG - ORDINANCE EXCERPTS

7.26 OPERATION OF DIRT BIKES (2 OR 3 WHEEL MOTORIZED VEHICLES) WITHIN CITY LIMITS

No person shall operate an unlicensed dirt bike (2 or 3 wheel motorized vehicle) within the Reedsburg City limits. If such vehicle is licensed, then it may be operated in such areas as otherwise authorized by law, however, in no event shall the vehicle be operated on city property without obtaining prior written permission from the City.

7.34 ALL TERRAIN VEHICLES

Wis. Stat. Sec. 23.33(2m), (3), (3g), (4), (4c), (4g), (4j), (4l), (4p), (4t), (4z), (5), (6m), and (13) regulating the operation and use of all-terrain vehicles are adopted herein by reference.

ASHLAND - ORDINANCE EXCERPTS

Codification Ordinance No. 507

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE OPERATION OF ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES (ATVS) AND UTILITY-TERRAIN VEHICLES (UTVS) IN THE CITY OF ASHLAND

The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ashland does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1:

The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Ashland adopts the following all-terrain vehicle and utility-terrain vehicle ordinance for the operation of all-terrain vehicles and utility-terrain vehicles upon roadways listed in Section III.

Following due consideration of the recreational value to connect trail opportunities and weighted against possible dangers, public health, liability aspects, terrain involved, traffic density and history of automobile traffic, this ordinance has been created.

SECTION II: Statutory Authority

All provisions of Wis. Stats. of 23.33 are adopted by this reference.

SECTION III: Routes

All public streets designated and signed as ATV routes shall be open to ATV and UTV traffic. Routes shall be approved and designated by the Mayor and Chief of Police and signed by the Public Works Department/or their designee.

SECTION IV: Conditions:

As a condition for the use of this route, the following conditions shall apply to all operators (and passengers where applicable);

a) All operators shall possess a valid driver's license.

b) All operators and passengers under the age of 18 shall wear a protective helmet.

c) ATVs and UTVs shall be operated on the far right side of the roadway surface.

d) ATVs and UTVs shall not be operated at speeds in excess of 10 miles per hour.

e) Routes must be signed in accordance with NR 64.12, and NR 64.12(7)c.

f) ATVs and UTVs operated on signed routes in the City of Ashland shall have stock unmodified exhaust systems.

g) ATVs and UTVs shall not be allowed to operate within the City of Ashland between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Sunday through Thursday.

h) ATVs and UTVs shall not be allowed to operate within the City of Ashland between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 6:00 a.m. Friday and Saturday.

Sequential Ordinance No. 1691 (9/10)

Codification Ordinance No. 507

SECTION V: Enforcement

This ordinance shall be enforced by any law enforcement officer of the City of Ashland, Ashland County, Wisconsin.

SECTION VI: Penalties

Wisconsin State All-Terrain Vehicle penalties as found in s. 23.33 (13)(a) Wis. Stats. are adopted by reference. Any violations of Section IV listed in this ordinance shall carry a \$250 fine for first infraction and a \$500 fine for any subsequent violation.

SECTION VII: Severability

The provision of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and it is expressly declared that the City of Ashland Common Council would have passed the other provisions of this ordinance irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid. If any provision of this ordinance or the application to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions to other persons circumstances shall not be deemed affected.

SECTION VIII: Effective Date

This ordinance becomes effective upon passage and publication.

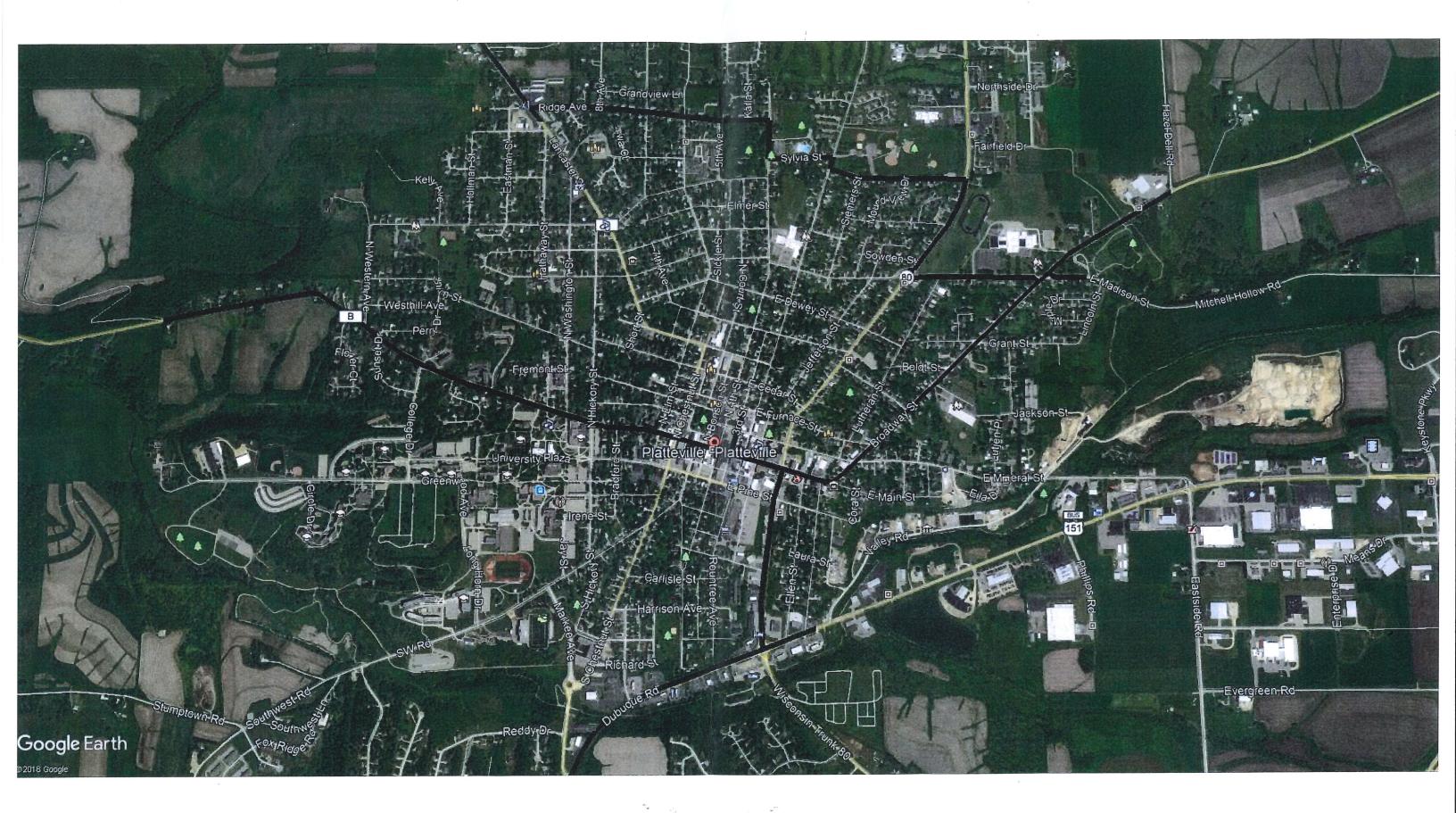

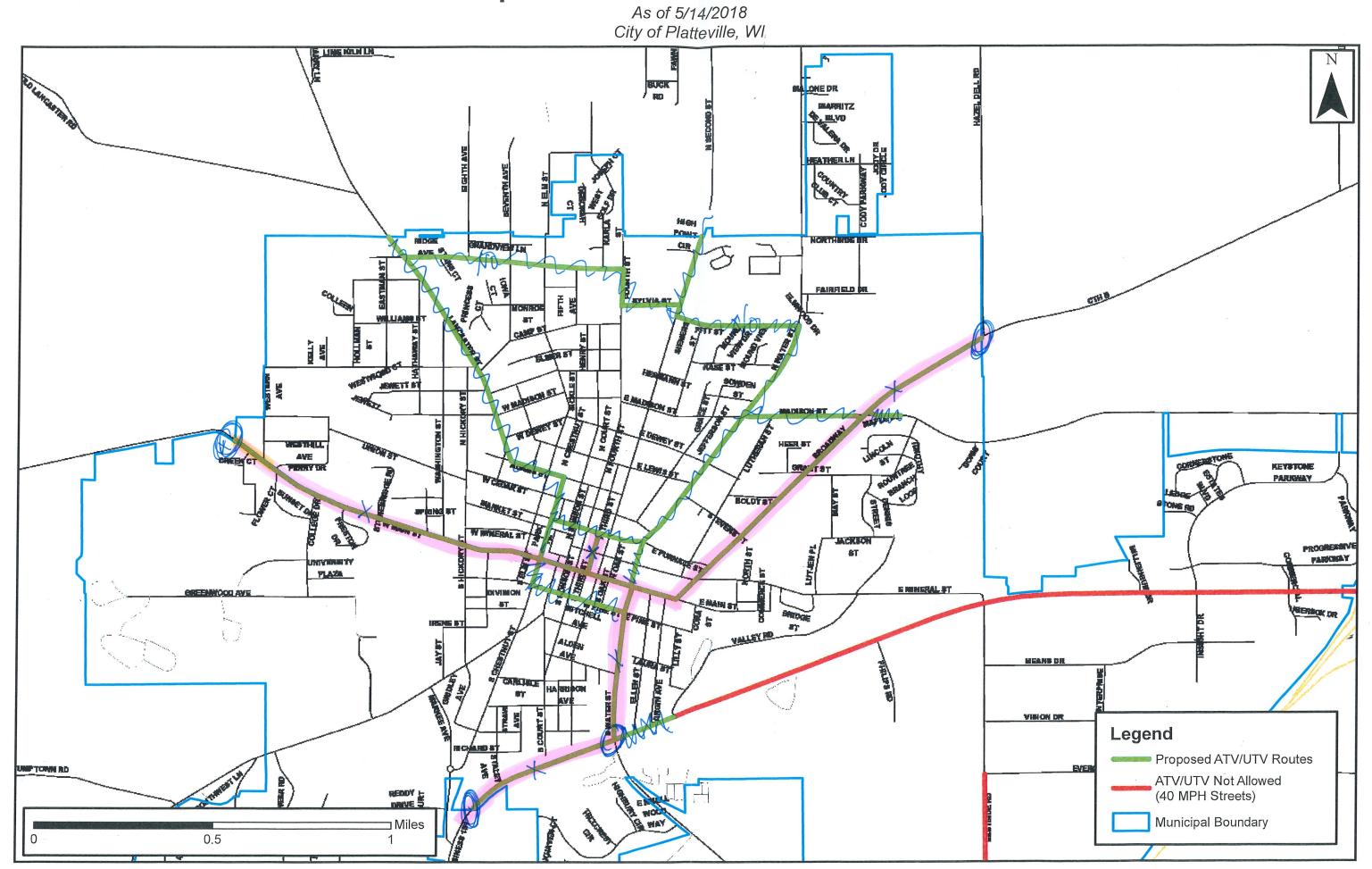

Description:

For many years there have been crashes on Business Highway 151 that can be attributed to turning traffic. Staff, in conjunction with Wisconsin DOT, reviewed a 5-year period from 2011 to 2015 and determined that there was a higher crash rate than the state average on Business 151 from Staley Avenue to Insight Drive/Keystone Parkway. There were 74 total non-intersection and 48 intersection crashes during this time.

Working with the WI DOT, Staff submitted a Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) funding request for improvements on this section of road. The primary emphasis is to reduce traffic crashes due to turning movements. The proposed solution is to overlay the entire pavement with a Thin Overlay – similar to the Thin Overlays done throughout the City. Once done, Business 151 will be repainted so that there will be 3 lanes – one in each direction and one center left turn lane. It is called a Two Way Left Turn Lane (TWLTL). This is similar to the section of Water Street from Pine to Business 151. From Staley Ave to Water St, we expand the lanes from 2 to 3 lanes by narrowing the wide shoulders. The same configuration will be done from Water Street to Eastside Road. The turn lanes at Water Street will stay the same. At Eastside Road, there will be dedicated left turn lanes and signals. From Eastside Road to the divided 4 lane road by A&W, the existing 4 lanes will be reconfigured to 3 lanes. There will be separated left turn lanes with signals in both directions at Insight Drive/Keystone Parkway. Studies have shown that at the relatively low levels of traffic on this section.

There will be pedestrian improvements as well for some but not all areas. The intersection at Business 151 and Water will have handicapped accessible pathways with pedestrian signals. The sidewalks will connect to the trail at Super 8. There will be a pedestrian/bicycle trail on the south side of Bus 151 from the David Canny Rountree Branch Trail bridge crossing by NOVUS to Eastside Road. There will be pedestrian signal crossings at Eastside Road/Mineral St to connect trails to the existing sidewalk. From Eastside Road to the divided 4 lane section, the wide shoulders will accommodate bike traffic.

The proposed project will be in design in 2019 with construction in 2020. There will be time to conduct public outreach and engagement during the design review process and make minor adjustments to the plan. Any costs above the budgeted cost is not subject to cost sharing and must be paid for 100% by the City. Major changes to the scope must be approved by WI DOT. These would include removing a section of the road configuration changes.

Budget/Fiscal Impact:

This project is a 90/10 split. As a safety program, the State is willing to pay for 90% of the budgeted project costs. The City will be expected to pay 10% of the budgeted project costs and any cost overruns. Included in the packet is a copy of the Agreement between the State and the City outlining responsibilities and cost sharing. Staff put a place holder in the 2019 CIP for this project and will include it in the proposed 2019

budget for design and in the 2020 CIP for construction. The budgeted cost is \$1,152,941 with the City expected to provide \$115,294.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends approval of this project and grant the City Manager the authority to sign the Agreement with the WI DOT.

NEEDS AND ESTIMATE SUMMARY:

Existing Facility: Business Highway 151 is a two-lane road from Staley Ave. to Mineral St. with turning lanes at the intersection with Water St. There are 8-foot wide paved shoulders on each side except near the intersection. From Mineral St. the road is a 4-lane undivided road for approximately 0.5 miles, then it becomes a 4-lane divided with turn lanes. The undivided 4-lane segment has 48-foot width with 2 foot paved shoulders on each side. It is a business corridor with many driveway and turning movements. There are no bicycle or pedestrian accommodations. There are many rear end crashes due to inattentive driving. There has been one bicyclist fatality.

Proposed Improvement: It is proposed to convert the two-lane section into a three-lane section with a TWLTL. This will separate the left turning traffic from the through traffic thus reducing the rear-end crashes. The 0.5 mile 4-lane undivided segment will also be converted to a three-lane roadway with a TWLTL. Pedestrians and bicyclists will be accommodated with upgrades to traffic signals and pedestrian friendly crossings at Water St. and Eastside Road/Mineral St. A shared use path from an existing trail to Eastside Rd. will accommodate pedestrians and bicyclists where the wide shoulders are removed for the TWLTL.

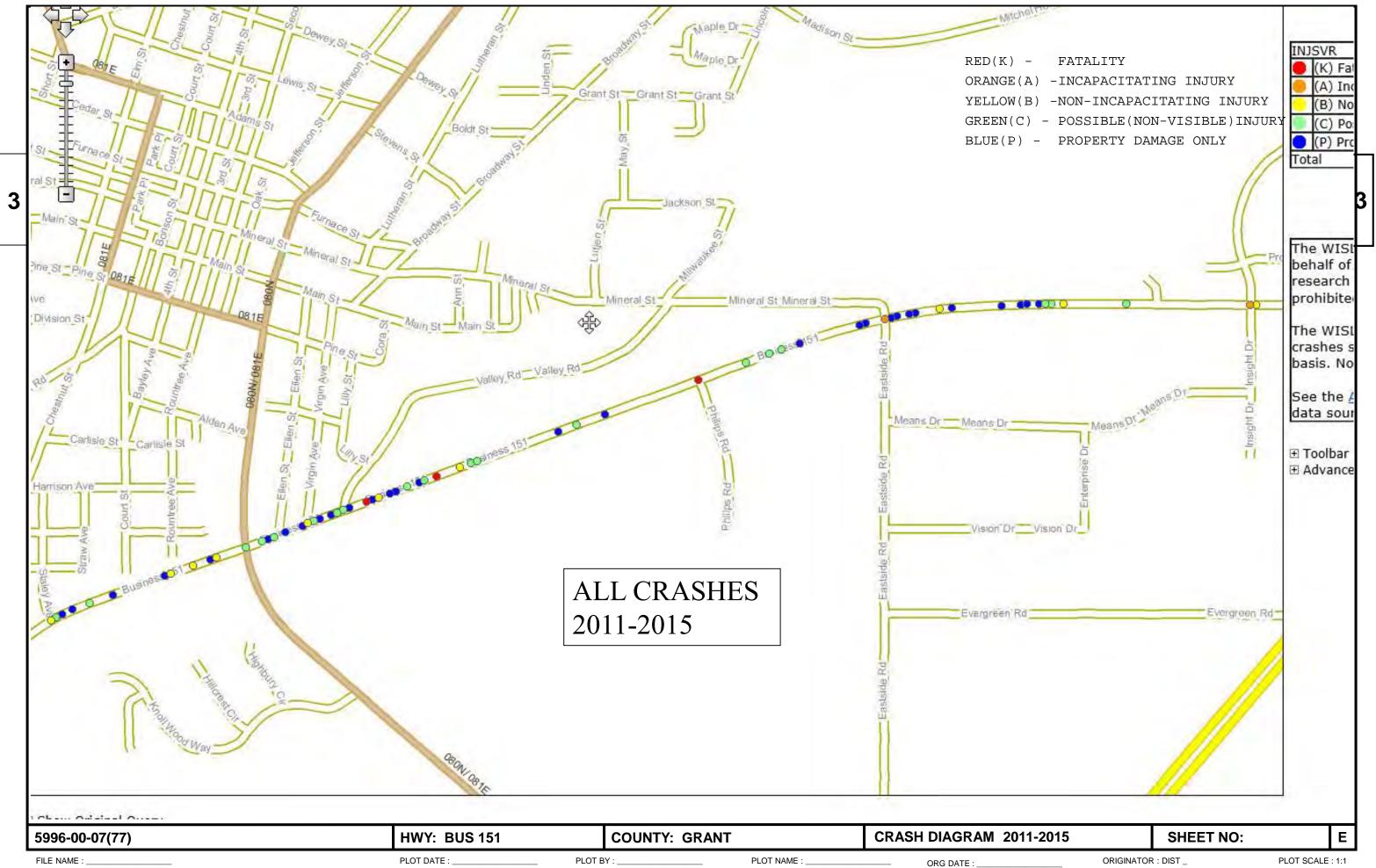
- 1. The initiation and accomplishment of the improvement will be subject to the applicable Federal and State regulations.
- 2. The Municipality will pay to the State all costs incurred by the State in connection with the improvement which exceed Federal/State financing commitments or are ineligible for Federal/State financing.
- 3. Funding of each project phase (preliminary engineering, real estate, construction, and other) is subject to inclusion in an approved program. Federal aid and/or State highway fund financing will be limited to participation in the costs of the following items:
 - (a) The grading, base, pavement, and replacement of disturbed driveways in kind.
 - (b) Construction engineering incidental to inspection and supervision of actual construction work.
 - (c) Signing and pavement marking, including detour routes.
 - (d) State review services
- 4. Work necessary to complete the improvement to be financed entirely by the Municipality or other utility or facility owner includes the following items:
 - (a) New installation of or alteration of sanitary sewers and connections, water, gas, electric, telephone, telegraph, fire or police alarm facilities, parking meters, and similar utilities.
 - (b) Damages to abutting property due to change in street or sidewalk widths, grades or drainage.
 - (c) Conditioning, if required, and maintenance of detour routes.
 - (d) Repair of damages to roads or streets caused by reason of their use in hauling materials incidental to the improvement.
 - (e) Real estate for the improvement.
- 5. As the work progresses, the Municipality will be billed and agrees to pay for work completed which is not chargeable to Federal/State funds. Upon completion of the project, a final audit will be made to determine the final division of costs and the Municipality agrees to pay any required reimbursement to the State.
- 6. If the Municipality should withdraw the project, it will reimburse the State for any costs incurred by the State in behalf of the project.
- 7. The work will be administered by the State and may include items not eligible for Federal/State participation.

- 8. The Municipality will at its own cost and expense:
 - (a) Maintain all portions of the project that lie within its jurisdiction for such maintenance through statutory requirements, in a manner satisfactory to the State and will make ample provision for such maintenance each year.
 - (b) Prohibit angle parking.
 - (c) Regulate or prohibit all parking at locations where and when the pavement area usually occupied by parked vehicles will be needed to carry active traffic in the street.
 - (d) Assume general responsibility for all public information and public relations for the project and to make fitting announcement to the press and such outlets as would generally alert the affected property owners and the community of the nature, extent, and timing of the project and arrangements for handling traffic within and around the projects.
 - (e) Provide complete plans, specifications, relocation order, real estate plat, and estimates.
 - (f) Use the WisDOT Utility Accommodation Policy unless it adopts a policy which has equal or more restrictive controls.
- 9. In order to guarantee the Municipality's foregoing agreements to pay the State, the Municipality, through its above duly authorized officers or officials, agrees and authorizes the State to set off and withhold the required reimbursement amount as determined by the State from any moneys otherwise due and payable by the State to the Municipality.
- 10. The basis for local participation is as follows:

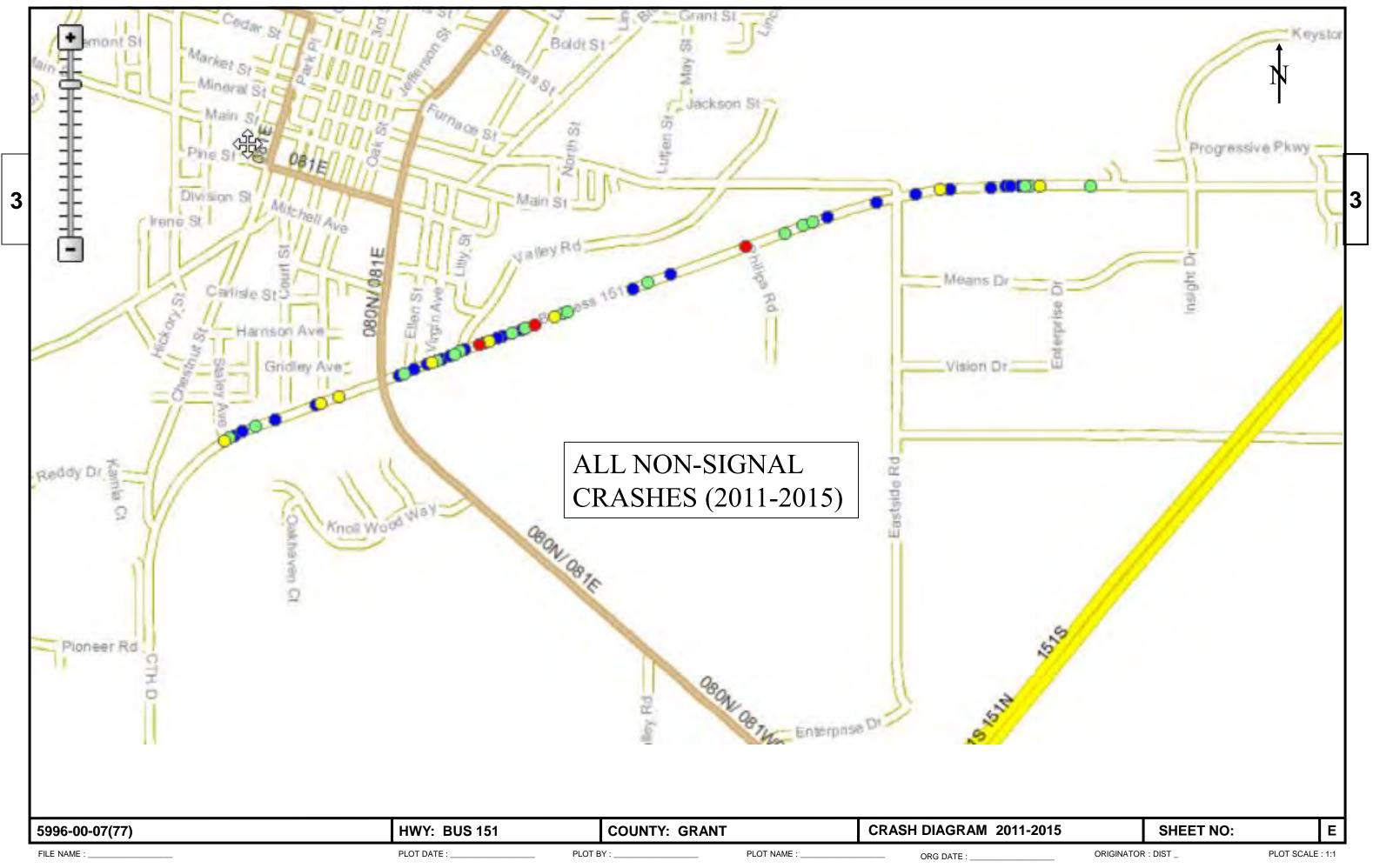

Description:

BACKGROUND

 The applicant is interested in purchasing the former K-Mart property at 1425 E. Business Highway 151. The applicant would like to use the building and property for storage, truck and trailer rental, and related uses.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

2. The applicant is interested in purchasing the property for use as a U-Haul moving and storage facility. The current building would be used for storage, retail sales of moving-related products, installation of trailer hitches, and related uses. The existing parking area will be used as a storage, display and preparation area for the rental trucks and trailers, as well as for customer and employee parking. Additional self-storage buildings would be constructed on the east side of the building, in an area that is currently grass and loading area. The business will have approximately 15 employees, both full-time and part-time. The hours of operation will be 7:00 am to 7:00 pm Monday thru Thursday, 7:00 am to 8:00 pm Fridays, 7:00 am to 7:00 pm Saturdays, and 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Sundays.

STAFF ANALYSIS

- 3. The use of the property for truck and trailer rental is a permitted use. The use of the property for storage buildings is classified as a Conditional Use in the B-3 zoning district, so the request requires review by the Plan Commission and approval of the Council.
- 4. When considering a Conditional Use permit, consideration must be given to the standards listed in Section 22.13. Specifically, this section allows for the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit when it is shown that the "uses and structures are in accordance with the purpose and intent of (the Zoning) Ordinance and are found not to be hazardous, harmful, offensive, or otherwise adverse to the environment or the value of the neighborhood or the community." There is adequate space on the property to accommodate the proposed buildings and truck/trailer storage, and the proposed use is compatible with the surrounding businesses. Overall, the proposed use appears to be in compliance with these requirements.

RECOMMENDATION

 Staff recommends approval of the Conditional Use Permit to allow the warehouse/selfstorage uses as proposed.

Narrative Project Summary

AMERCO Real Estate Company (AREC) has prepared this application package for the opportunity to receive the City of Platteville's participation and counseling in regards to a Conditional Use Permit for the property located at 1425 E Highway 151, Platteville, WI. AREC is the wholly owned real estate subsidiary of the U-Haul System.

The proposed 12.36 acre property is located at 1425 E Highway 151, Platteville, WI. U-Haul is proposing an adaptive reuse of the existing building by converting it into a U-Haul Moving and Storage Facility. Our uses consist of self-storage, U-Haul truck and trailer sharing, and related retail sales. The interior of the building will be retrofitted to house self-storage units. This infill development will allow U-Haul to better serve the storage needs of the community and activate a property that is currently underutilized.

The property is currently zoned B3- Highway Business. The use of self-storage requires a Conditional Use Permit. U-Haul is proposing to apply for the permit to allow this use. The building will be used structurally as is with the exception of imaging and signage.

U-Haul will be providing a valuable service to the city, as we are a one-stop shop for the moving and storage needs of our customers. It is important to recognize the significant economic and community development changes that have occurred throughout the country and the city of Platteville in regards to the decline of "big-box" stores. A perfect example of this is the outdated "big-box" retailer such as Kmart. These retailers are closing at a rapid pace leaving behind large buildings that then remain vacant for years at a time. By converting this building through an adaptive reuse, we are continuing a long and proud history of revitalizing commercial properties. We have been met with great success in turning these properties into productive businesses that both provide jobs and help promote infill development.

Custom site design for every U-Haul store assures that the facility compliments the community it serves. Adherence to community objectives is key in order to ensure each U-Haul store is both a neighborhood asset and an economic success.

U-Haul is more of a commercial type use that serves the residential communities within a 3-5-mile radius. We feel the U-Haul would be an appropriate use for the property and there are proven benefits for allowing self-storage facilities in communities:

- Self-storage facilities are quiet
- They provide an excellent buffer between zones
- They create very little traffic
- They have little impact on utilities
- They have no impact on schools
- They provide a good tax revenue
- They provide a community service

U-Haul Moving and Storage is a convenience business. Our philosophy is to place U-Haul stores in high growth residential areas, where we fill a need for our products and services. Customers are made aware of the U-Haul store, primarily via drive-by awareness, much like that of a convenience store, restaurant or hardware store. Attractive imaging and brand name recognition bring in area residents — by our measures, those who live within a four-mile radius of the center.

The U-Haul Store:

U-Haul stores characteristically serve the do-it-yourself household customer. The U-Haul Store will be staffed with 10-15 employees, both full-time and part-time. Families will generally arrive in their own automobiles, enter the showroom and may choose from a variety of products and services offered there. When situated near public transit, approximately 50% of those families utilize alternative transportation to access U-Haul equipment and services.

- Families typically use U-Haul Self-Storage rooms to store furniture, household goods, sporting equipment, or holiday decorations. During transition periods between moves, moving to a smaller home, combining households, or clearing away clutter to prepare a home for sale, storage customers will typically rent a room for a period of two months to one year.
- U-Haul stores also provide truck and trailer sharing for household moving, either in-town or across country.
- Families who need packing supplies in advance of a move or to ship personal packages can choose from a variety of retail sales items, including cartons, tape and sustainable packing materials.
- Families who tow U-Haul trailers, boats, or recreational trailers can select, and have installed, the hitch and towing packages that best meet their needs.
- Moving and storage are synergistic businesses. Over half of our storage customers
 tell us they used U-Haul storage because of a household move. Customers will
 typically use U-Haul equipment or their personal vehicle to approach the loading
 area and enter the building through the singular customer access. All new U-Haul
 stores are designed with interior storage room access, giving the customer the

added value of increased security, and the community the benefit of a more aesthetically pleasing exterior.

- All U-Haul storage customers are issued a card-swipe style identification card that must be used to gain access to their room. This is but one of many security policies which protect the customer's belongings and decrease the ability of unauthorized access to the facility.
- It is against policy for a business to be operated from a U-Haul storage room.
- Customers and community residents who wish to use the on-site dumpsters for disposing of refuse must gain permission to do so, and are assessed an additional fee.
- Items that may not be stored include: chemicals, flammables, and paints.
- U-Haul stores are protected by video surveillance.
- U-Haul stores are non-smoking facilities.
- U-Haul will provide added services and assistance to our customers with disabilities.

Traffic Study:

 U-Haul stores generate less vehicular traffic volume while still embodying an active-use site. Truck and trailer sharing and self-storage all represent dynamic transitions from one customer to another. DIY moving customers are presented with opportunities to utilize equipment and storage on a temporary basis, supporting a shared-economy, an effective economic model and an environmentally-sound way to conduct business.
