Dear Common Council,

I would be honored to be considered for membership on the Common Council of the City of Platteville. This is my fifth year living in Platteville and I have come to care deeply about its civic life. I currently serve on the Plan Commission and the Community Development Board. I also volunteer my time extensively to serve the community. I am a weekly trail maintenance volunteer for the Platteville Community Arboretum (PCA). I was President of the Rotary Club of Southwest Wisconsin (2018-19) and continue to volunteer my time in the club, working for the community at such events as Southwest Health Berry Fest and by contributing to food pantries and community tree-planting, among other activities. Additionally, I have significant leadership experience as Assistant Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Education, and a former Department Chair of Criminal Justice, both at UW-Platteville. My experience and knowledge of parliamentary procedure and governance is well-developed.

Platteville is a growing small city that can boast a high quality of life and strong community cohesion. In my time here, I have come to know many wonderful people who care deeply about their city and from them I have been inspired to be involved. I have several favorite aspects of the city, in particular the new Platteville Public Library, the David Canny/Rountree Branch trail, and the historic buildings dotting the downtown area. I also greatly appreciate the natural landscape of the Driftless region, its rolling hills and oak trees.

If appointed, I have three areas of improvement I would champion, though I also anticipate learning about other important issues and contributing thoughtfully in a variety of ways. Last year's rain was extensive, highlighting the need to be proactive to avoid trail bridge wash-outs and over-run culverts and sewers in the future. The third area is economic development. I would like to contribute to policies and programs that would attract new small businesses to our downtown area, as well as maintain a positive and beneficial relationship with our larger businesses.

I have the characteristics that would make an effective and enthusiastic Common Council member. I am involved in the community, listen and talk about civic life with a wide variety of people around town, and have leadership experience. I possess strong public speaking skills. Most importantly, I would approach the position with a sense of service and with the ethos that my job is to represent others in the community and to think selfless-ly and broadly in helping the city in its important decision-making.

I feel that I am qualified to fill the vacant At-large Alderperson seat as I served on the Planning Commission for several years when Merle Strauss was City Manager. I served on the Park Board for five years and President for two of those years. During that time we were working on the new pool project. I also served on the City Council for three years during the term served by City Manager Larry Bierke and City Manager Karen Kurt. Dear Common Council Members:

I am grateful for the opportunity to be considered for the vacant council seat, previously held by Alderperson Cena Sharp. During my employment at UW-Platteville the last 7+ years, I have served in several capacities in campus governance. Last spring, I completed a second 2-year term on the Academic Staff Senate, having the role of Secretary for the first term and Vice President during the second term. I have also served as Chair of several university committees in addition to my role as Academic Staff Senator.

Originally, I came to Platteville as an undergraduate student in 2001, and ended up becoming a resident after I completed my Master's degree in 2007. Since then, I have started a family, and have fallen in love with the many things Platteville has to offer. As a parent, I have many positives to say about our schools, specifically the elementary schools where my daughters currently attend. The park system offers many opportunities for our youth and families, and the recently completed Rountree Branch Trail adds a vital recreational opportunity for our area.

When considering areas of focus and/or improvement, I believe that making data driven and needs driven decisions is important. It is vital for our community members to be able to provide a voice and input into what their needs are versus what a handful of individuals think are the needs of the community. If selected, I would want to spend some time reviewing existing data and continuing to look for opportunities in which additional data will be important for decision making. One area that has stood out for me since being in Platteville is housing, specifically in the areas of rental properties and the lack of options for some demographics. I previously have owned a rental property, and have been frustrated with accountability of landlords at times. I am also concerned about the removal of the requirement of having a rental inspection from the city code.

As an effective common council member, I feel it is important, to the best of their ability, to be free of any personal agendas and/or solely focused on only supporting specific issues. While it is impossible to meet the needs of every citizen in our city, I feel it is important to work as much as possible to have an impact on the most people we can. I also feel it is important for a council member to be a strong listener – being able to hear others and refrain from defensive responses. Approaching issues and discussions with a sense of curiosity rather than who's right or wrong is essential for civil discourse.
