Residents, Council Members, Commissioners, and City Manager Rohloff,

I'm going to change things up as I compose the cover letter for the 2025 annual report. Typically, I recount the accomplishments of the PD or recap the year that was but this year I'm feeling a bit nostalgic and introspective. I have announced my retirement from law enforcement after 35 years and I'm thinking a lot about the changes in policing and the Platteville PD in particular that I've seen during my career.

Advances in technology and a new police facility are the obvious changes I could cite when I look back at my career in Platteville. Yes, these advances have been very impactful. They affect how we do business at every level. In spite of this, I firmly believe the process of seeking and ultimately obtaining accreditation status through the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group (WILEAG) has been the single biggest improvement I've experienced during my tenure. The accreditation standards are stringent, and they require our staff to consistently perform to the level of the standards in everything we do. This enhances the professionalism of our staff and the level of pride we have in our department. Professionalism in policing equates directly to improvement in the level of service we provide to the Platteville community. We emphasize customer service and compassion in our agency culture, and we derive a lot of satisfaction from knowing that we're doing everything we can to deliver a quality work product in everything we do.

I've had people ask me what I want my legacy in policing to be. My first thought is that legacies are things that presidents and world leaders are concerned with. I never really aspired to be the Chief of Police until I'd done it as the acting Chief for several months, and I definitely didn't accept the position in order to leave a legacy of any kind. My goal today is the same as it's always been; do the right thing, in the right way, for the right reason(s) and hopefully at the right time. It's not a guarantee but if you can live up to these goals, the rest usually takes care of itself.

It's been the honor of my professional life to be a Platteville Police Officer and to serve the City of Platteville. I feel very confident about the future of the Platteville Police Department because we've got a culture grounded in service, compassion, and professionalism.

*Professionalism:* We shall serve the community with the utmost respect by demonstrating humility, competence, and compassion.


*Continuous Improvement:* Through training, education, and interaction with the community we will continuously improve the services we provide.

# Command Staff

Under the general direction of the City Manager, the Chief of Police is responsible for planning, coordinating, supervising, and evaluating all police department operations. On a day-to-day basis, the two Lieutenants' responsibilities include supervising investigators, telecommunications, training, scheduling, purchasing, and communications. The Office Coordinator supervises the front office staff and assists the Management Team. The Management Team works together on budgeting, policy development, program development, and the general administration of the Police Department.



## Chief of Police Doug McKinley

Chief Doug McKinley is a 1990 graduate of UW-Platteville. McKinley was one of the department's Emergency Vehicle Operations Course (E.V.O.C.) instructors and has also taught at the UW-Platteville Recruit Academy, the Southwest Wisconsin Technical College, and as an Adjunct Professor at the UW-Platteville. McKinley was formerly a lieutenant in charge of the Support Services Division at the department as well as the Project Director of the Iowa-Grant Drug Task Force. Doug started as a patrol officer with the Platteville PD in 1991. # Telecommunicators

The Public Safety Telecommunicators answer telephones for the following city departments and other agencies: The Platteville Police Department, Southwest Health Ambulance Service, Platteville Fire Department, UW-Platteville Police, emergency elevator telephones throughout the city, and all City of Platteville Offices (when those offices are closed). The phones include the Enhanced 911 (E911) system that immediately displays the name, phone number, address and directions to the location of the phone making the call. The E-911 database allows the Telecommunicator to enter information that is pertinent to the location or customer. The Platteville Police Dispatch Center receives in excess of 1,500 incoming 911 calls (this is separate from the non-emergency business line they also answer 24/7).

The Telecommunicators communicate with all the previously listed agencies using the following radio systems: Platteville City Government, Platteville Fire, Southwest Health Center, UW-Platteville, Grant County Sheriff, County Simulcast Paging System and Point to Point (connecting all police agencies). The Telecommunicators can also monitor WISPERN.

The Telecommunicators dispatch in excess of 14,000 police, fire, and ambulance calls per year. Public Safety Telecommunicators also enter and retrieve information in and from the State and National Crime databases, vehicle registration files and driver's license files. This information includes criminal activity, missing persons and stolen property. This national computer system allows this department to share information with the nation's law enforcement and criminal justice agencies. The Support Services Commander supervises the Telecommunicators.

In addition to their dispatching duties, the Telecommunicators handle a variety of complex tasks. The tasks include entering on average 300 warrants per year to include monthly validations of all warrants, and completing over 300 background checks for other city departments. They also serve as a point of contact for the public when the business office is closed. Because the Platteville Police Department Dispatch Center is staffed 24/7, they also serve as a layer of security for the department by monitoring the internal security cameras for prisoner safety, officer safety, unauthorized persons on premises, proper conduct by persons on premises, and building security. All Telecommunicators are also notary publics, offering that service 24/7 as well.

# 2025 Community Service Officers

The Police Department Community Service Officer Program (started in 2000) is in its 22<sup>nd</sup> year of delivering non-emergency services for our community. CSO responsibilities include parking enforcement, non-critical clerical tasks, home security checks, vehicle lockouts, traffic direction, school pedestrian safety, problem solving, etc., to name a few. You will see them assisting with a number of events such as parades, Sweet Treats on Main and Trick or Treating, Dairy Days, and others. The CSOs also supply support for the Animal Control Program. Officers are equipped with a 4-wheel drive truck used for delivery of essential, but non-critical police services.

The position of Community Service Officer is a non-sworn civilian position that assists police officers by responding to lower priority calls for service (mentioned above). This allows police officers to remain available to respond to high priority emergency calls and have more time for proactive enforcement.




# Drone Project

In 2023, Officer Stowe initiated the fundraising efforts to acquire a drone for the police department. By the end of 2024, the necessary funds were secured to purchase the drone! Enough funds were procured to cover the cost of the drone, training, and licensing. While fundraising, Officer Stowe conducted thorough research into the training and licensing requirements for drone operations. This involved exploring certifications and training needed for law enforcement agencies to ensure that officers would be equipped with the skills to operate the drone safely and effectively. The drone will be utilized in a variety of scenarios, including search and rescue missions and crime scene documentation. Officer Stowe has also been working closely with local agencies that already utilize drones in their operations. This collaborative effort will strengthen the department's ability to deploy drone technology effectively, improving outcomes in both search and rescue operations and crime scene investigations.



## Principal Functions/Major Programs (What does this unit do?)

The City is served by 20 full-time sworn Officers (this number includes 11 Patrol Officers, 2 Detectives, 4 Sergeants, 2 Lieutenants, and a Chief), 1 full-time Office Coordinator, 3 full-time and 3 part-time Dispatchers, 1 full-time Administrative Assistant, and 4 Limited Term Community Service Officers. Together these employees provide the following:

- Emergency Dispatch Services: 24-hours a day for Platteville Police Department Officers, the Platteville Emergency Medical Service, the Platteville Fire Dept., and the University of Wisconsin-Platteville Campus Police Dept.
- Contingency Dispatch Center for the Grant Co. Sheriff's Dept. and back-up 911 Emergency Call Center for Grant County.
- Enforcement: Enforces state statutes, local ordinances, and traffic laws.
- Specialized Investigations: 2 detectives pursue matters requiring time-intensive investigation or incidents requiring expertise not typically possessed by line officers.
- Patrol: 24-hours a day to detect criminal activity and to provide a police presence.
- Community Policing: Engaging members of the community to resolve issues of mutual concern.
- School Officer (CRO): Works extensively in the schools and coordinates community events and outreach for the PD.
- Community Service Officers: UW-Platteville students employed as non-sworn members of the PD handle non-emergency calls for service, direct traffic, animal complaints, home security checks, and enforce parking ordinances.
- In-house training of officers: To enhance professionalism, engage in career development, reduce overtime, and provide officers with the skills needed to respond to calls for service in a rapidly changing environment.
- Member of the Richland-Iowa-Grant Drug Task Force: A unit specializing in the investigation of drug related incidents.
- Crisis Resolution Team: The PD participates in the county-wide tactical team which responds to calls of an elevated risk such as barricaded suspects, high risk warrant service, etc.
- Crossing guard duties at Camp/Lancaster Intersection.




## PART 1 CRIME CALLS

In Wisconsin, all sheriff departments and police departments in communities with a population of 1500 or more and University of Wisconsin campuses submit monthly reports to the Wisconsin Department of Justice, Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Office. These Part 1 crimes fall into eight categories as follows:

1. Non-Negligent Manslaughter – Recklessly causes the death of another under circumstances that show utter disregard for human life. (This includes Overdose deaths being investigated as non-negligent manslaughter)
2. Sexual Assault – forcible carnal knowledge of a female.
3. Robbery – taking anything of value from a person by force or threat of force.
4. Aggravated Assault – unlawful attack by one person upon another (use or threat of use of a weapon or serious injury).
5. Burglary – unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.
6. Theft – unlawful taking of property from the possession of another (this does not include fraud).
7. Motor Vehicle Theft – theft of a motor vehicle.
8. Arson – willful burning of a structure, motor vehicle, or personal property.








Traffic Violations (Incident Count)





## Platteville Police Department Re-Accreditation






## **2025 Commendations and Year of Service Milestones**
